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E D I T O R I A L

It's been a long drag from the Hawthorns to here  
but with a bit of luck it will have been worth  
the wait. If the Swans go on this season like  
they finished the last then the Jacks are in for  
a storming time. The Swans at the end of 92/93  
were at times a delight to watch, almost on a  
par with the start of the season and that's  
saying something. The closed season departures  
from the club were unsurprising (even the sale  
of Little), apart from perhaps Steve McMahon who  
on the few occasions he was on view in the first  
team seemed a banker for the future. Agboola,  
Coughlin, Cullen and West leaving were more  
predictable, although West would have got our  
boot up his arse about 10 seconds after the  
final whistle at the Hawthorns. Leggy's leaving  
was expected and should be heartily mourned, his  
hardwork and perseverance earned him not only  
rewards on the field but also off it, he'd  
established himself as a firm favourite by the  
end of last season. There can be no doubt that  
as far as Legg was concerned the arrival of  
Frank Burrows at the Vetch was on a par with the  
arrival of Moses in Egypt for the Israelites. He  
led Leggy out of the wilderness and no doubt  
into the land of plenty (or a new BMW). 92/93  
season was Leggs finest in a Swans shirt (and  
therefore his finest ever), the peak of which  
may have been his goal against Stoke which may  
be the best goal ever scored at the Vetch, or  
the equaliser against Cardiff - both of which  
will give Legg a permanent place in our  
memories.

No doubt about the big media story for the  
closed season i.e. Cardiff City. The media are  
up to their old tricks and its only to be  
expected from the arsewipes, the editors

maintain that only a campaign of boycott and complaint will remove the spectre of bias from Welsh sporting journalism.

In an atmosphere of speculation and rumour Cardiff City crabbled the headlines for what they didn't do, they didn't get a buyer, and they didn't sign any decent new players. Meanwhile the Swans rebuilding remains unapplauded. The signing of Torpey, Cook, and Hodge in particular received not even a comment between announcements of the cancellation of cricket and Ratcliffs contract with Cardiff. The chase for Pascoe was not covered because the Swans were clear front runners, and no mention is made of the 'unofficial' championship of Wales' for season 93/94, because this year there will be no question of who's the premier Welsh club - it'll be who finishes highest in the league - and that will be the Swans.

However the editors are not uncritical of our local media. John Burgum appears to have given up on inquiring journalism and settled instead for the happy life of the occasional uninformative piece on the reserves fixtures. The Post sporting section has become tired and dull. It's time for a change of personnel at the local rag and we urge you to write to the Post demanding change so that the Jacks can get a sports reporter prepared to dig into stories and hassle our football club for more details of its operations.

Season 93/94 is likely to be an interesting season all round. The prospect of a league derby matches is enough to wet the appetite, but the thought that Swansea City F.C. may be able to build on last season makes the average Jack foam at the mouth. As John Cornforth might say -

No.1 - the Manor Ground, Oxford

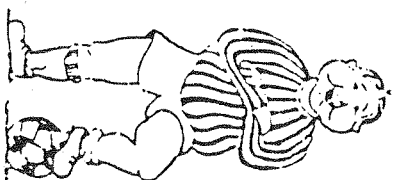

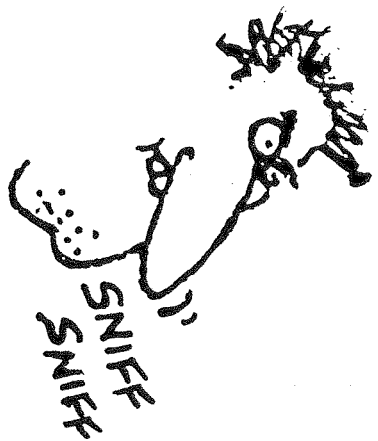

My father lost his temper for almost the first time I could remember, whacked me across the back of the head and said, 'have I brought you up a fuckin English, remember Llewelyn and be grateful you're not a pit boy' - my father called all those from the South 'pit boys'. I'd obviously touched a raw nerve, and a nerve that is still just as sensitive with Reds fans. For every one person from Wrexham who I know follows the Reds I know at least one other who makes the regular trip into England to follow one of the many

Well we decided to ask one, a regular at Wales games. Here are his views on the troubles down South and life in general.

English clubs within an easy train ride away.

Many still support Wrexham, but more in the way of a second team. At times when success beckons this situation is even harder to bear and many wounds that appeared during Wrexhams recent promotion season will take a long time to heal.

Viewed from North Wales the arguments in the South about press bias seem but a drop in the ocean compared to our troubles. In the area that I live you get better reception on the English regional T.V. than on the Welsh channels. The press (T.V. or otherwise) view Wrexham as very much the fourth club in Wales and the occasional paragraph is all Reds fans can expect. For us in the North, East v West doesn't count, Merthyr get more coverage than us.

We also suffer a greater loss of players than either of our league rivals in Wales. Clubs like United, Liverpool, Everton etc. have easy access to our youngsters and the local grounds where normally the local club would pick up available talent. This makes it even more remarkable that Wrexham are surviving let alone developing a classy young side. Swansea losing Des Lyttle and Cardiff's fear over losing Nathan Blake are nothing when you have teams like United or Liverpool heavy breathing over your youngsters.

Our problems don't stop there, many of the local club sides play in weekend leagues across the border, and the cream of local club talent play in the better organised

and more prestigious English club leagues.

In this atmosphere of being the small club battling against the odds it seems ridiculous to us Reds fans that the rivalry between Cardiff and Swansea extends to Wales games. Knowing as I do both Cardiff and Swansea fans it is an awkward moment at Wales games when we all meet up for a drink before the game, I wonder if they'll try and kill each other. Of course they don't as we've been mates for years, but there are some that will, Reds fans usually stand back in disbelief when the Taffs v Jacks thing gets going at Wales games. Personally I remember my fathers words (well some of them anyway), 'remember Llewelyn'.

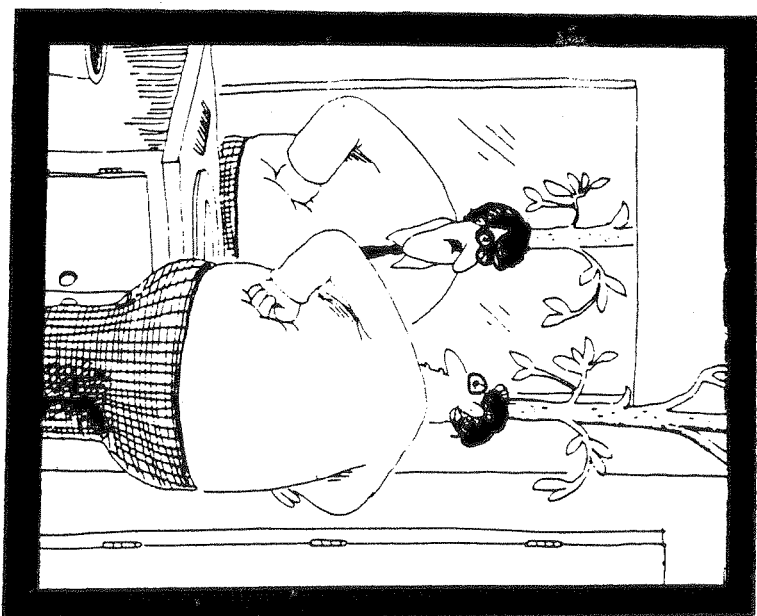

## ARE YOU REALLY HAPPY ???

The Footie mag. 'When Saturday Comes' recently carried out a fan satisfaction survey. They rated satisfaction with all the league clubs performances, both on and off the field and averaged out the results to give league tables. The results were a mixed bag for the Welsh clubs with some interesting questions raised. Overall in the 2nd division the Swans finished in the bottom half, their overall performance suffered because of fan dissatisfaction with the admin. side of things (rated in the left hand column - the lower the score the greater the satisfaction).

Fans were in general sad and irritated with the clubs administration. On the playing front (other column) things looked better, fans were reasonably content.

Cardiff City and Wrexham on the other hand finished 1st and 2nd in the league for the 3rd division. Quite rightly the fans were satisfied with the playing performances, in fact they were very happy, the results for satisfaction on the admin. side showed the fans to be reasonably content. This is surprising given recent events at both clubs off the field, culminating in a recent protest by Cardiff fans.

The results in the 3rd division may show how much satisfaction with the behind the scenes activities of the club depends on playing success, however this is not borne out by the Swans results. Where success has not been reflected in confidence in the administrators. I would say it probably has more to do with the faith the fans have in the person in charge. Doug Sharpe is not the worlds best communicator and suffers for it in the way the fans lack confidence in him. He's also made some major blunders in his time as chairman, not least I would say the reappointment of Terry Yorath and his failure to adequately explain the clubs financial difficulties.

It has to be said however that Swansea City F.C. at the moment seems to be the least troubled of all the Welsh clubs, the finances appear healthy if you listen to Burrows and Sharpe, (personally I prefer to listen to Burrows), contracts have been signed, players are being bought and all in all S.C.F.C. gives the impression of being a smoothly run ship.

In contrast Wrexham and Cardiff are at the moment washing their hands in public, which is a shame given that they're starting the season with fans optimism apparently high. In Cardiff's case, and looking on as an outsider, it appears the problems revolve around Rick Wright, Wrexham's difficulties however seem to stem from the inevitable financial balancing act that has to be carried on by all lower league clubs.

Although it may please football club chairmen to see that satisfaction with their clubs administrative set up is high, I'm certain that a high degree of distrust is far more healthy in the dirty world of running a football club. Personally I found it quite satisfying to see that the majority of fans were either so, so or sad and irritated by their clubs administration. It shows that football fans are unwilling to trust people that are likely to sell major chunks of a successful team (a la Dougie). I hope for the sake of the future of Welsh football that come next seasons survey Cardiff and Wrexham fans remains very happy with their team, but become sad and irritated or downright furious with the backroom boys who as a rule should only be trusted to shit on you from a great height.
