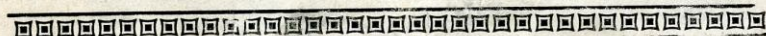

Win over Huddersfield was very encouraging

THE clear cut victory over Huddersfield in mid-week was not only highly entertaining but very encouraging and the 15,000 odd who saw the game must have left the ground feeling they had had their money's worth.

It was a fine exhibition of soccer by two teams even though their styles contrasted. Probably the most heartening feature was the smooth and efficient manner in which our forwards moved and young David Dodson showed again his capabilities for snapping up chances to score both goals. There might easily have been more, so over-ran was the Huddersfield defence at times.

Our new goalkeeper Neol Dwyer could not have made a happier home debut. He followed up a competent performance at Roker Park with another fine display which was stamped with international class. It was very heartening too, to see our younger players show that they have benefited from the experience of playing in this class of football and I am sure we are going to have much more from them.

Congratulations also to our Combination team which started off the season with a narrow but well deserved win over Plymouth Argyle Reserves at the Vetch.

COME ON A GREAT DEAL

Today we welcome Plymouth Argyle, over whom we scored our biggest success—6-1—last season. Argyle have come on a good deal since then and proved this by getting their revenge with a 3-1 win on their own ground last Easter.

Our guests have made a fair start to the season and we can be assured of another hard fight for points this afternoon.

They obtained a convincing 3-0 victory over Stoke City in their opening match but lost away to the powerful Sheffield United team who are already being tipped for promotion.

The Argyle have a lively attack with Wilf Carter, their leading scorer with 22 goals last season and George Kirby providing the spearhead. Kirby came to Home Park from Sheffield Wednesday last season with a goal-scoring reputation, but failed to strike form and only scored two goals. But Argyle are hoping for better things from him. He started the season well by scoring against Stoke.

INJURY PROBLEMS

When these notes were written the Swans were beset by injury problems. It was hoped that Colin Webster who missed the game against Huddersfield would be fit.

Next week we have two away matches—against Huddersfield on Wednesday evening under floodlights and at Norwich on Saturday. It will be our first visit to Norwich since we were in the third division.

There is tremendous enthusiasm at Carrow Road, where last season the City averaged the best gates in the division and there is sure to be a big crowd to welcome the Swans.

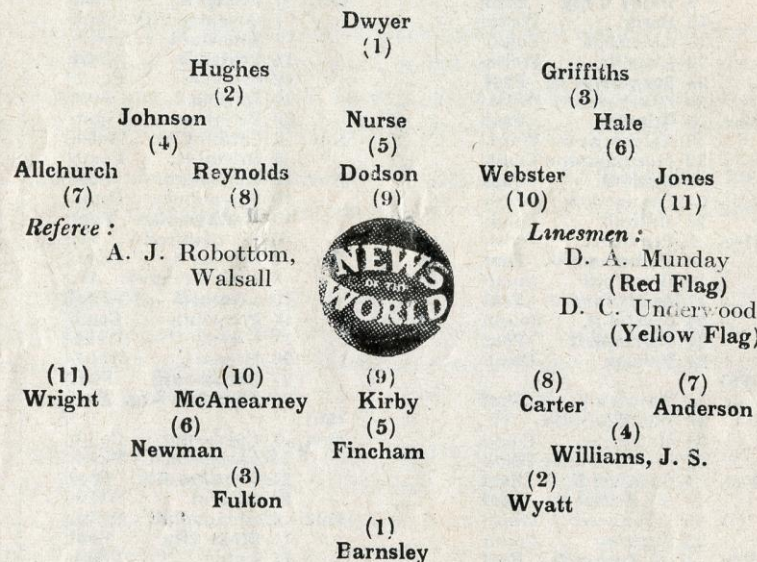

GEOFF BARNESLEY (Goalkeeper). A Midlander from Bilston, Staffs, who became a professional with West Bromwich Albion in 1952. Barnesley made only one first team appearance while at the Hawthorns. He moved to Plymouth in 1957, and soon established himself in the senior side. Last season he was an ever-present.

REG WYATT (Right-back). Originally an inside-forward, Wyatt, who is a local product, signed professional forms for Plymouth in 1950. He was later switched to full-back, and made his debut in the rear-guard in September, 1955. At the end of the following season he moved again to centre-half, and had a long spell there before reverting again to full-back in the closing stages of last season.

BRYCE FULTON (Left Back). Ayr born Fulton began his career with Manchester United in 1953. The galaxy of talent at Old Trafford restricted him to second team football, however, and prompted his move to Plymouth in November, 1957. He played his first senior game in February the following year, and has subsequently alternated between both full-back positions.

JOHNY WILLIAMS (Right-half). A native of Plymouth, Williams has spent the whole of his career with his home-town club, signing as a professional in 1955. He played for a time at inside-forward and centre-forward before moving into the middle line. His form there has been such that Plymouth have had numerous offers for his transfer from First Division clubs.

GORDON FINCHAM (Centre-half). After making 49 senior appearances for Leicester City in nearly six years at Filbert Street, Fincham was transferred to Plymouth in the summer of 1958, but did not win a first team place until March last year. Then he played in the last thirteen matches which ensured promotion for his new club. He was a regular at centre-half in the latter part of last season.

JOHN NEWMAN (Left-half). The first four signings made by the Devonshire club late last winter in their successful effort to avoid relegation, Newman joined them from Leicester City on January 5. His experience stood the team in good stead in the crucial end-of-the-season matches. A native of Hereford, Newman had six years with Birmingham before moving to Leicester for about £12,000 in November 1957. He can play well anywhere in the middle line.

PETER ANDERSON (Outside-right). Another locally-born member of Plymouth's team is Peter Anderson, who, though regarded chiefly as an outside-left, can play with equal facility on either flank of the attack. Signed as a professional in 1950, he broke a leg early in 1955-56 and was out of action for twelve months. Last winter he scored three goals in 27 League games.

ALEX JACKSON (Inside-right). The bearer of a famous footballing name, Jackson, a Glaswegian, was signed by Plymouth from Birmingham City just before the transfer deadline in March last. Really a centre-forward, from where he once scored six goals in six games for the Midlanders' senior side, he played all his five matches for the Devonshire club last term at inside-right.

GEORGE KIRBY (Centre-forward). It was not until his fourteenth appearance for Plymouth, after signing from Sheffield Wednesday on January 7, that Kirby scored his first goal. He ended with two in 17 outings, and naturally hopes for better fortune this season. Born in Liverpool, Kirby had nearly four years as an Everton professional before joining Wednesday in March, 1959. In twelve months at Hillsborough he made only three senior appearances.

JIM McANEARNEY (Inside-left). Unlike his brother Tom, who has been a regular member of Sheffield Wednesday's senior side for several years, Jimmy McAnearney was never able to command a regular place with the Yorkshire club, whom he joined in 1952. A native of Dundee, he signed for Plymouth the day after Kirby, and added much craft to the Devonshire club's front line. McAnearney scored three goals in his 17 games last term.

BILL WRIGHT (Outside-left). A utility man who can fill any forward position, Wright hails from Blackpool, and had five years with his local club before moving to Leicester in August, 1955. In 1958 he went to Newcastle, and on to Plymouth in the summer of 1959. Last season he played on the left wing and as leader of the Argyle attack, netting four times in 16 League appearances.

DAVE McLAREN (Goalkeeper). The only experienced newcomer to the Home Park payroll during the summer, McLaren rejoins former Leicester City colleagues in Newman, Fincham and Wright. Born at Auchterader, he was with Dundee for twelve months before signing for Leicester in January 1957, and had a long spell of first team duty at Filbert Street before losing his place to Gordon Banks last season.

WILF CARTER (Inside-forward). Despite the fact that he missed six of the last eleven matches, Carter was Plymouth's leading marksman with 22 goals last term, for the third time in succession. Hailing from Wednesbury, Staffs, Carter joined West Bromwich Albion in 1951, playing 57 First Division games in six seasons before moving to Plymouth in the 1957 close-season. He has also played occasionally at centre-forward.
