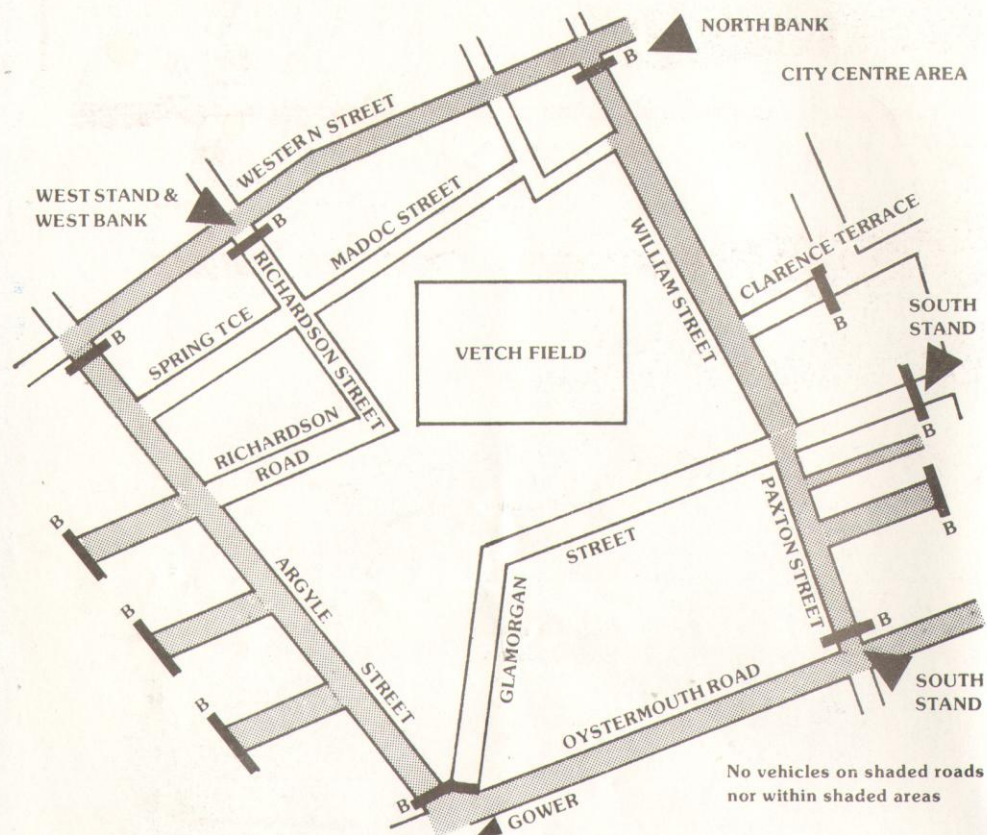

Manager's Notes

Tonight's Welsh Cup Semi-final brings to the Vetch the current holders of the trophy, Shrewsbury Town, in what promises to be an exciting encounter. Graham Turner's team achieved a notable double last season by winning the Third Division Championship and carrying off the Welsh Cup after beating Wrexham in the final last May.

The draw has given us home advantage for the third successive time in this year's competition and we will be doing our utmost to earn a place in the final against either Newport or Merthyr. One of the things I have missed most since leaving Liverpool has been the regular involvement in European soccer and I would dearly love to see Swansea City competing with the best in Europe in next season's Cup Winners' Cup. Victory tonight will take us one step nearer that target.

Our last league game at the Vetch resulted in a disappointing 4-2 defeat by Cambridge United and, once again, defensive lapses proved to be our undoing. The loss of Robbie James so early in the game was obviously a severe blow and the nature of Robbie's head injury was very worrying at first. Happily, there was no fracture but he has suffered some damage to the inner ear and he has been told to take things easy for the time being. I am sure you will join me in wishing Robbie a speedy recovery, and we hope to see him back in action very soon.

Last week saw the departure of Danny Bartley to Hereford United. Danny has been a fine servant of the Club and a great favourite with the fans, and I am sure he will do well for his new club. He leaves with the good wishes of everyone at Swansea City.

Finally, back to tonight. Despite our somewhat erratic home form this season, you have continued to support us in superb fashion. Tonight's game is a very important one for the Club and if you get behind the boys from the kick-off, I'm sure we can get the right result.

Swansea City and the Welsh Cup have done Welsh football good service this season. That isn't meant to sound boastful but just look at our crowds against Kidderminster and Pontllanfraith in the previous rounds - over 4,000 people each time!

There is a real feeling in this area that 1980 is going to be 'our year' in the Welsh Cup and, with due respect to both our previous opponents, they would not have attracted anything like that size of crowd if they had been drawn at Wrexham or Cardiff.

Our two rival clubs in the Second Division have dominated the competition for 14 years since the Swans last victory in 1966. Tonight's opponents, Shrewsbury Town, have beaten them in a couple of recent finals -

but the interest has always returned to Cardiff or Wrexham by virtue of them still qualifying for the European Cup Winners Cup as losing (Welsh based) finalists. There is nothing like a change for shaking up a competition and giving it new life. That is what we have contributed to the Welsh Cup this season... and I hope that we can do so again this evening.

I saw Merthyr's player-manager Doug Rosser following the draw for the semi-finals and he was a little disappointed that his club had not come out of the hat to face us. "A draw against the Swans at the Vetch Field is the top attraction in the Cup this season," he said

I remember that we once faced Rhyl here with a massive crowd of around 14,000 arriving to cheer us on to victory. In fact, we lost 1-2 and were left with some egg on our faces - but then that is the appeal and the true excitement of Cup football!

My biggest disappointment, however, was missing the 1956 Final against Cardiff City. It was a match that had been built up into one of the clashes of the season but, the day before the game, Swansea agreed terms for my transfer to Tottenham.

That meant that I could not have a place in the Final because of the injury risk; Des Palmer came in and featured in a dazzling match. Cardiff went three goals up before we hit back twice and almost saved ourselves in front of a huge, excited crowd at Ninian Park.

DID YOU KNOW

If a Semi-Final is replayed and the number of goals is equal in the two matches played, then each away goal shall count twice. If this procedure does not bring a result, then the winners shall be determined by a series of five penalty kicks at the end of the Semi-Final replay and the second leg of the Final Tie.

CHOICE OF ENGLAND SO RIGHT

By 'Outsider'

In the end, the right man got the job. The appointment of Mike England as manager of the Wales Senior, Under-21 and Youth sides was the best possible solution. He now guides Welsh international football into a new decade of hope and progress.

Being one of the finest Welsh players of post war years is just part of England's qualifications. In his later years as a player it became increasingly obvious that he had outstanding managerial qualities. Highly articulate, poised, immensely knowledgeable and with a background of impeccable pedigree . . . all the pieces of the jigsaw puzzle fell into place.

Motivation - the very fact that he **wanted** the job and crossed the Atlantic to get it - is borne out by his financial sacrifices. His football with Seattle Sounders, coaching clinics and property deals gave him an estimated income of £35,000 in the United States.

That part he confirmed in interviews immediately after his appointment: what he would not say, however, was his salary with the F.A.W. Beyond any doubt, however, it is less than half of that rich American income. Thus Mike England was able to point out with total sincerity "Money has never been a decisive factor for me. Job satisfaction takes first place every time."

He was a winner himself and it is inconceivable to think that anything but the same fierce, driving competitive standards will be applied to his work as national team manager.

England is quite frank, too, about the problems he faces in preparing Wales for the Home International Championships in May and the first World Cup game against Iceland on June 2nd. "I must depend, to a large extent, on the people I know in the game. John Toshack comes right at the top of that list. I'm lucky that I'm coming into a job with so many friends like him that I can call on. In the same bracket are Arfon Griffiths, Alan Durban, Alan Mullery and Terry Venebles. By the same token, one of my first calls will be to Mike Smith. All the knowledge of players and organisational abilities which Mike brought to the job are at his finger tips. Being the man he is and the way he feels about Welsh football, I know that everything he possesses will be at my disposal."

"Equally, Terry Yorath will play a major part in helping me get off the ground. In fact, I played for Wales at the start of his captaincy and thoroughly enjoyed the experience. The last thing in my mind is to start making changes in that direction."

Within 48 hours of his appointment, England was on his way back to Seattle. "I want to get all my affairs there wrapped up as quickly as possible. I need to be back in Britain by the end of April to get on with the job of preparing for the Home Internationals," he stated.

The World Cup is, of course, target number one. Two countries qualify for the finals in 1982 from a busy group of

Iceland, Czechoslovakia, U.S.S.R. and Turkey: the new manager is convinced that Wales will occupy one of those two places. It is far from wishful thinking.

Turkey are of the most recent memory. They were beaten by Wales at Wrexham in the qualifying competition for the current European Championship but gained narrow revenge at home. Wales must aim for four points there and are capable of achieving them.

The same return from the two games against Iceland goes without saying and the group could boil down to Wales v U.S.S.R. v Czechoslovakia. The Czechs are not quite the force they were and Wales outscored them in the last World Cup qualifying tournament - 3-0 at Wrexham and a 0-1 defeat in Prague only because Leighton Phillips unluckily touched the ball into his own net.

The Russians are far more remote in time than either the Czechs or the Turks. The only experience of playing against them came for Wales in 1965 in qualifying games for the World Cup finals of the following year. Wales lost 1-2 in Moscow but reversed that scoreline in Cardiff - when Mike England won two of his 44 caps for Wales!

He brings new ideas, new tactics and tremendous zeal to the post of Wales manager. It was not just saying the right words when he told his first Press conference "The honour and pride I feel at this moment cannot be put into words. To manage one's country is the finest accolade of all."

Those are the values that England will bring to the job . . . values enhanced by his own success and his own professionalism. The England era should be one of new excitement, fresh challenges and more triumphs.

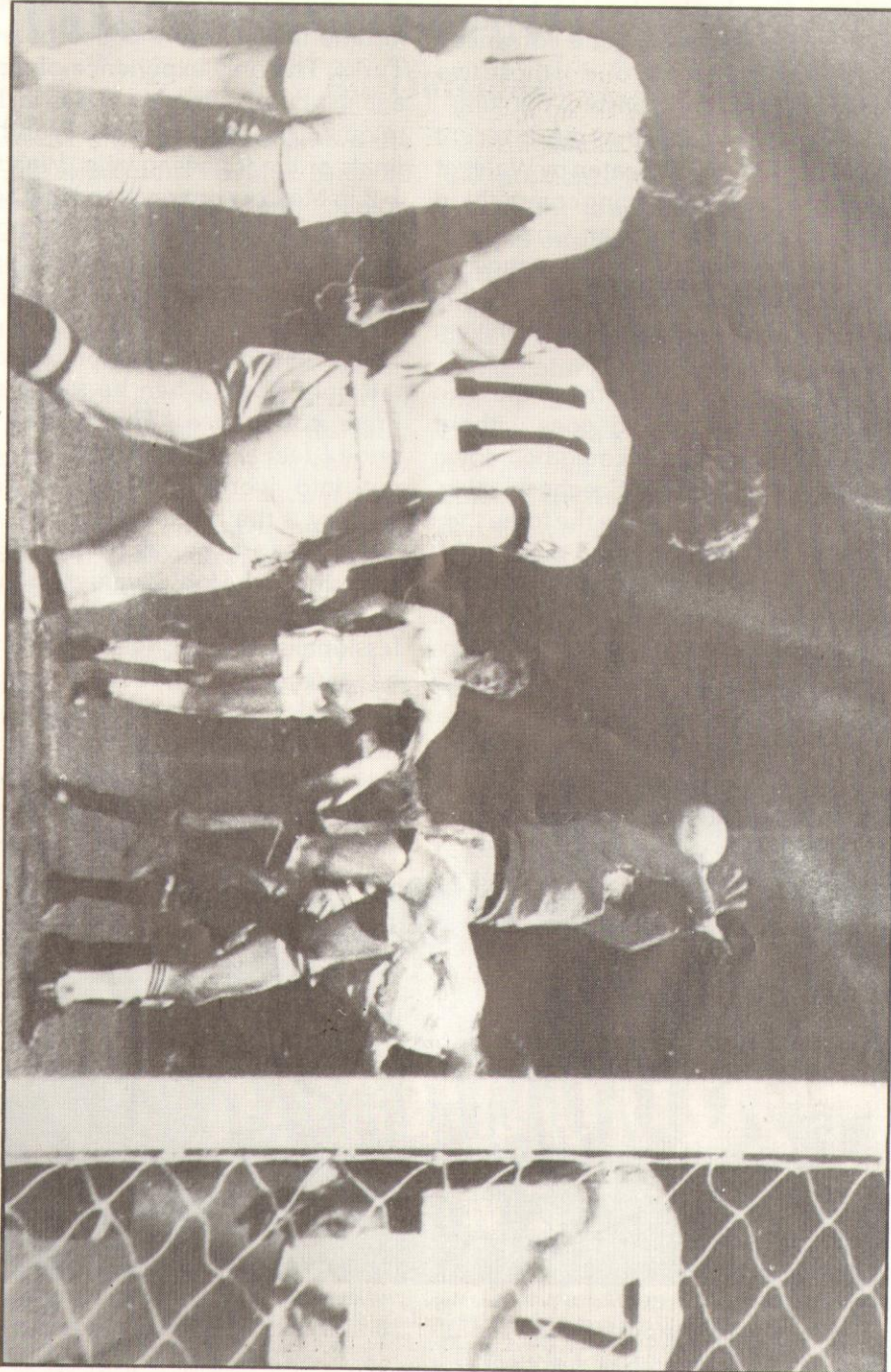

European football so exciting says Dave

There cannot be another club in the Second Division with so many players experienced in top level European club football. Among them, of course, is goalkeeper Dave Stewart who played for Leeds United in the semi-final and final of the 1974-75 European Cup.

"One of the many appealing aspects of joining Swansea was that fresh chance of playing in Europe again," he says. "I very much hope that we will be in the Cup Winners Cup next season because competing in European football is a marvellous experience.

"In fact, it is the semi-final of the 1974-75 European Cup which I remember rather more pleasantly than the final - because we lost that to Bayern Munich after attacking for almost all of the match!"

"Our semi-final opponents were Barcelona and it was generally felt that the winners of that clash would go on and capture the trophy. The first leg was at

Elland Road and we won that 2-1 with Billy Bremner and Allan Clarke on target for us... but it was the second leg that produced the most vivid recollections.

"The Barcelona stadium has an atmosphere which sends the blood racing and it was packed that night. Well over 100,000 packed the ground in a sell-out tie and there was tension that you could cut with a knife. Peter Lorimer gave us the lead with one of his 'specials': a 25 yards thunderbolt."

"From that point on, Johann Cryuff and his players launched a tremendous onslaught against us. We were penned into our own half and I had to make a string of saves. The pressure became tighter and tighter before Clares equalised in the 70th minute."

"Soon after that Gordon McQueen was sent off for striking Clares - but we held out in a fantastic finish as the Spanish side attacked from all directions. That is the kind of occasion that European football produces!"

SOCCER SURPRISES No. 5

Some managers are never satisfied with their teams. On at least four occasions since the end of the war, clubs have made TEN team changes from one Football League match to the next. Oldham did in 1957, Derby County in 1960, Burnley in March 1961 and Notts. County on the last day of April, 1960.

★ How about this for an unbroken international partnership? Billy Bingham and Jimmy McIlroy (inside and outside right) both made their debuts for Ireland in 1951. Subsequently they played together 29 times until McIlroy had to drop out for a game in 1960. That's a record which will take some beating.

★ Jack Sutcliffe, a goalkeeper, made his debut for Bolton in 1889. His brother Charles made his debut with Rotherham in 1920 — 31 years later. Jack was the eldest and Charles the youngest of a family of twelve — so that little record will stay intact for a while too.

★ Here's a bloke to have on your side. In season 1934-35 Bradford City ran four teams in different leagues. Leading scorer in all four was Harry Adamson. There's another that'll take some beating.

★ Ralph Hunt of Grimsby scored in all ten of his club's early games in the 1959-60 Third Division. A tremendous sequence.

★ I know that goalkeepers go on playing for years, but Halifax must be a special place. In 1928-29 in the Third Division (North) they fielded two 'keepers during the season. Bob Suter (born 1878) and a 'lad' called Howard Matthews (born 1884) — an aggregate age of 94 years. Hey, c'mon Cally, you've got ten years in you yet!

★ Poor old Alan Duckworth. His Football League career lasted just 20 minutes — and he scored. He made his debut for Accrington at Barrow in 1935, went off injured after scoring, and never played in the League again.
