

## MANAGER'S NOTES

**DESPITE** the enforced changes we had to make going into the game at Hartlepool United on Monday, I was delighted with the performance and subsequent point we gained.

In many respects we went into the match on a hiding to nothing, but the players gave a good account of themselves and certainly deserved at least a share of the spoils.

Mathematically we still weren't safe going into the Hartlepool fixture, but results did go our way on the day and it now means it will take a minor-miracle for us to be relegated. The fact Hartlepool were celebrating promotion meant the pressure wasn't really on us, and this allowed us to relax in the build-up. I felt we passed the ball around nicely throughout the game and created some good chances. We did come under sustained spells of pressure during the 90 minutes, but you don't go to a side celebrating promotion and not expect this. We weathered these storms and finished strongly, and we must take great encouragement from this.

There have been a lot of disappointments throughout the campaign, but I would like to think that this particular aspect of the club has developed tremendously. Hopefully these young players will benefit from their experience this season and come back next year even stronger.

Looking back on our last home game, it was obviously a major disappointment to lose to Bury. We have suffered too many setbacks at home this season, but the reason we lost to Bury was that we didn't take the chances that came our way. I felt we had opportunities to win the match, particularly in the first-half, but we didn't take them and therefore eventually lost the game.

Today we welcome Swansea City to Spotland and their current predicament means they will come here and scrap for everything. They are likely to bring a

good travelling support with them, but it will be our job to quieten this support and send them back to South Wales disappointed.



# The importance of Goldbond

DURING the course of last week the club released its audited accounts for the years ending 31st May 2001 and 31st May 2002. These reports show the club made an overall trading loss of £146, 405 for this two-year period.

These figures were taken during the club's most successful period - results wise - in recent years, yet we still show a considerable trading loss. The figures that were published highlight the constant battle the football club faces against an ever-flowing tide of outgoings, whilst income obviously doesn't always match the levels required to match this expenditure.

A quick delve inside the Financial Statement reveals one or two very interesting facts. Firstly these figures have taken into account the £131,500 the club received in compensation for the departure of Steve Parkin and Tony Ford, and also the £220,000 received from the subsequent sale of Gary Jones. Also within these reports, donations totalling £532,829 can be found from the Development Association. Now if you are wondering what the Development Association is and how can it donate over half a million pounds in the space of two years, well this is Goldbond!

Throughout the course of the year club staff work extremely hard to maximise the profit of our weekly draw competi-

tion, and we receive excellent help from our army of agents. In total we have over 200 agents who act on behalf of the club every week, and as you can see by the donations made to the club on a yearly basis, it is well worth the effort. I hope every supporter inside this ground today is appreciative of the work done by fellow fans that act as our agents.

The Commercial Department is constantly asked by staff from other clubs how we manage to sustain such high membership to our lottery; the simple answer is by working extremely hard. Only three weeks ago we had a member of the Torquay United Supporters' Club spend an hour with us picking our brains about running a lottery. In her words: "Our Chairman says it's too much hard work running a lottery, so we've decided to run one on behalf of the club." How on earth a club of the size and stature of Torquay United can afford NOT to run a lottery is beyond belief!

Club staff are always looking at ways of expanding the income we receive via the Goldbond Weekly Draw, but our geographical location means we cannot expand the boundaries of where we collect because we impose on the territory of other clubs. I've got to be honest and say this isn't something that particularly bothers us, because at the end of the day we are a business and competition is competition, but it's finding collectors and agents in these areas that

is an impossibility. A football supporter living in Bury or Oldham isn't going to collect on behalf of Rochdale - they would rather collect on behalf of the club's they support.

The biggest hurdle we have found in recent years has been recruiting Dale supporters who work in factories or Dale supporters who work in an office who could act as agents for us. We can go and knock on people's front doors every night of the week and ask them to join to Goldbond, but we cannot simply walk into an office or factory.

This is where we need your help; we need supporters to come forward and take up the mantle themselves. Only this week Scott Goulding, from the newly formed Supporters Club in South Manchester and Cheshire, came forward and had recruited 59 new members for the club. This will bring in revenue of over £1200 in a single year and it all counts. So if you work in an environment where you think you could recruit a few new members for us, it doesn't matter if it's just three or four, then make a visit to the club shop after the game today. Our doors are always open.

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## A depressing time on-line

**FOLLOWING** our 1-0 home defeat to Kidderminster, [Harriersonline.co.uk](http://www.harriersonline.co.uk) reported: 'The Harriers came out with all guns blazing knowing that nothing other than all three points would do. Rochdale seemed to have lost interest now and their only chance of a goal came from McCourt but he couldn't connect with Hockenhull's cross and failed to convert it (sic.).'

'Dean Bennett went close for us with a shot that went wide after a great run from him but a few minutes later we had wrapped the game up.'

'Scott Stamps had come on for Adie Smith ten minutes earlier and it was from his long throw in that we scored. Griffiths could only half clear it and it fell for Shilts, who made no mistake with a half volley from the edge of the box. The ball beat the keeper and gave us a well deserved win to get us 'back on track'.'

It's been a familiar pattern online for a few weeks now, with little of encouragement to share with you. The Rushden and York away performances were greeted with due praise by our fans online, especially the manager's professionalism when having decisions to make regarding Matthew Gilks' injury at York.

The pro-management supporters online have mainly used the insult as a supporting case. A loss of 1764 HOME fans in 12 months between Hull at home on 9th April 2002 and Bristol Rovers at home on 8th April 2003 has been a talking point. Another has been one young fan's constant promotion of his side's appearance at Spotland for the Dennis John Trophy last Wednesday night!

Protests and banners and the consequences thereof have been frequent topics of discussion online between fans. The manager said such actions had a detrimental effect in the build up to the Bristol Rovers game. Fans took heed. After the home defeat by Kidderminster Harriers he told the official site: 'The supporters were fantastic tonight, they stuck with us and kept behind us, but sadly we were flat

second half and we couldn't take the game onto them and give the supporters a lift.'

One angle of discussion on the message board has surrounded the forthright comments Richard Bott made in his notes for the bury game. Mr Bott wrote: 'If we suffered a hangover from last season's failed promotion bid, we might just have suffered another from the FA Cup adventure.'

With this in mind I visited two websites of the other teams who missed out on the play-offs last season to see how they were getting on.

[www.thediamondsfc.co.uk](http://www.thediamondsfc.co.uk) said: 'Rushden & Diamonds celebrated their promotion to the Second Division by returning to the top of the league following this 2-1 victory over Carlisle United at Brunton Park. This win means that promotion to the Second Division has been achieved at only the second time of asking. It's a wonderful milestone for the club and a fantastic achievement from the players.'

Their manager Brian Talbot said: 'We have only had a squad of 20 players all season and the kids that have come in have been superb. I could not have done it without them but the senior players have been the cornerstone. We have gone top and that's nice but we must focus ourselves on the remaining games and not take our foot off the pedal. We all want to go on and win the title.'

Up at The Vic, [www.inthenet-hufc.net](http://www.inthenet-hufc.net) reported with amazing irony: 'Only Hartlepool United could win promotion like this. A 4-0 defeat at the hands of Scunthorpe United saw Pools promoted to the Second Division as Bournemouth failed to win away at Hull City. It's a crazy world we live in when the fans of the team leaving the bottom division through automatic promotion are chanting the name of the previous manager in the final minutes of the penultimate away game of the season.'

Their message board was full of Poolies moaning!! However one voice of realism said: 'Would only believe it from this board though. By the way, we did it by winning more games than most others over the season. We have two home games coming up, which

we should win. Then we can win the championship! C'Mon Pools!'

One of those games to come was against Rochdale. Why this Pools fan's optimism after the thrashing they got at Spotland in December?

Perhaps he had a look at some of the in depth statistical material available at the [www.football365.com](http://www.football365.com) site in their 'interactive stats' section. One feature lets you look at league tables and results from a different perspective. Taking Division Three from 1st October 2002 to 19th April 2003, Rochdale are firmly in 24th place. We, along with Exeter, have a mere five wins from the last 31 League games, gaining 27 points in the process. Rushden and Diamonds have won 18 from 32 played, Hartlepool have won 17 from 32 played, earning 63 and 58 points respectively.

Over the last eight games, Dale are 23rd in the form table, with no wins, four draws and four losses. Only Shrewsbury have done worse in this spell. We are 22nd in the home form table, 11th in the away form table. We are 22nd in the form table for April as a relegation threat looms. We have won two of the last 14 games, both of those 1-0 through penalties.

The 'hangover' is enough to make you give up, like the 1764 Dale fans who did on 8th April.

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


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## APRIL 1998

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
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# Lee-thal from the penalty spot




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# The managerial merry-go-round

READING through fellow contributor Richard Bott's page for the Bury game, I noticed he included the statistic that Rochdale have had 12 managers in the last 20 years.

The reason for him including this statistic was to make the point that clubs don't achieve anything by chopping and changing their managers. It was a fair point to make, but it got me wondering how many managers the other clubs in our division have had over the last 20 years.

Ignoring the teams who have recently attained Football League status, there are some interesting observations to be drawn from the relevant information.

The club that has had fewest different managers in the last 20 years is Wrexham, who have only had to conduct manager interviews on four different occasions. This is largely due to the excellent stint performed by Brian Flynn who took over at the Racecourse Ground in the very late 1980s.

Flynn inherited a team that would have dropped out of the Football League but for the demise of Aldershot. By 1993 he had taken a young, enthusiastic team into Division Two and kept them there for a good few seasons.

Other clubs to have had reasonably few managers are: Bournemouth 5, Bury 7, Leyton Orient 6, and York 7. Again, these are clubs who have employed a manager who has done well with the team, thus lessening the necessity to give him the old heave ho!

At the other end of the scale are Southend with 17 different managers. This is almost a rate of one every season, and in the midst of this, The Shrimpers enjoyed a memorable rise to the heady heights of challenging for promotion to the Premiership in the early 1990s. Their subsequent slide down the league ladder, though, has shown the Essex club not averse to changing the gaffer as they look to restore former glories.

Other clubs with a high turnover are: Carlisle 14, Darlington 15, Hartlepool 15, Lincoln 16, Swansea 16, and Torquay 15. Interestingly, all of the clubs, except Torquay, have enjoyed at least two promotions in the last 20 years despite the high turnover. One argument behind this turnover is that promotion is often followed by a managerial casualty because the boss cannot sustain success in a higher division. On the other hand, a successful manager is more likely to be poached by a 'bigger' club.

So what of Rochdale? With our 12 different incumbents we are typically very average for the division which slightly undermines Richard Bott's assertion that we have been changing our managers too frequently for our own good. Where Rochdale have been unfortunate is that of those 12 Managers, four left the club for jobs higher up on the football ladder. This therefore puts us at a pretty low figure of eight enforced changes. Bearing in mind that the last 20 years have seen the club make one play-off appearance and only two FA Cup



runs of any note, the levels of tolerance and patience are evident to see. Indeed, there will no doubt be people reading this today who might conclude that, given the club's history on the pitch, a higher rate of managerial turnaround might have unearthed a better calibre of manager. On the other hand, change for changes sake can lead to a lack of consistency and direction, which can do a club irreparable damage. Manchester City in the late 1990s spring readily to mind!

The crux of the debate though is down to the individual to have his own opinion. Continuity, or change and change and change again until you get a good 'un.

It's a difficult one to call, but in the days of Parkin's 12 match winless run there were no calls for his head by the expectant Rochdale public. Perhaps it's a case of stick with the one you believe will get it right, and the statistics show that the Rochdale Board tend to give the man they think can do the job sufficient time to either prove it or not. It's not a bad philosophy at all and many clubs have benefited from it over the years.

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

# I'm enjoying my time at Rochdale

A LOT has happened in the life of 19-year old Darren Hockenhull recently. The Blackburn Rovers' youngster was whisked away from Ewood Park on transfer deadline day to spend the remainder of the season on-loan at Spotland, and since then his life has been turned upside down.

"It's a lot different to what I'm used to," said Hockenhull, when we spoke to him earlier this week.

St. Helens' born Hockenhull has been at Rovers since signing a YTS contract in 1999. Last summer he clinched his first professional deal with the club. That contract is due to expire this summer, and like many other players in that position, he doesn't know if another deal is waiting around the corner for him.

"I'm a bit in limbo really as I don't know if Blackburn are going to offer me a new deal. In many respects this is why I was happy to join Rochdale, because at the end of the day I'm putting myself in the shop window by playing first-team football."

Hockenhull was spotted by Rovers' scouts playing for non-league Burscough. At the time he was playing for the Under-18s at Victoria Park, but was quickly signed up by the Ewood Park club. Rochdale have previously raided Burscough to sign the likes of Kevin Formby, Alex Russell and Lee McEvilly, and following Hockenhull's displays since signing last month, Paul Simpson could have found another former Linnets' player capable of plying his trade at Spotland.

"I feel I've settled in really well. The lads were really friendly when I first arrived, and in many respects it helped that I came at the same time as Michael Taylor.

I've really enjoyed my time at the club so far, and if nothing is on offer from Blackburn then I'd be very interested in signing permanently, if given the opportunity.

"Prior to signing the manager told me he was looking to add a bit of quality into the side, and that he felt I was capable of doing that. It was nice to hear, and I hope I've rewarded his faith with my performances recently. Playing for Rochdale in Division Three is a lot different to playing for the reserves at Blackburn; it is a lot more physical. It takes time to adjust yourself to the pace of the game when you first arrive, but I'm learning and developing all the time."

When moving clubs there are a lot of new things you have to adjust to, but did Hockenhull envisage arriving at Spotland to find the supporters displaying banners and demonstrating at the end of games.

"I knew it would be hard. I'd obviously looked at where Rochdale were in the table prior to signing, and you have to be honest and say it doesn't help when the supporters aren't totally behind you. At the same time supporters are entitled to their point of view, so as a player you just have to get on with things."

The first goal of Darren Hockenhull's career has yet to arrive, but the recent game against Kidderminster should have seen the youngster hit the back of the net. He missed what can only be described as a sitter, and he still rues that miss today.

"I know I should have scored. It all came about a bit quickly, and I think I just stretched a little bit too much trying to score. It was a good move by the lads prior to me putting it into the stand, and it would have been nice to score. Unfortunately it wasn't meant to be on that occasion."

Today we welcome a Swansea City side that are battling to save themselves from relegation. This means our visitors from South Wales will be battling for every ball, and Hockenhull knows it will be a tough game.

"You expect nothing else when you play against teams that are scrapping for their lives. No player wants to have on his CV the fact that he was relegated with such a club, so it will be very difficult for us today. We will have supporters inside the ground that will want us to play attacking football and for Rochdale to win the game, so it will be up to us to forget about the opposition and try to please our fans. They have paid good money to watch the match, and we want to send them home happy."

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# Changes afoot in the Football League

SOME fairly radical proposals were discussed by the 72 Nationwide League clubs at their last get-together of the 2002/03 season in Leicester on Thursday.

If one of them received substantial support there could be more clubs involved in the end-of-season play-offs in future.

Another, of much greater significance, concerned the parlous state of the finances of so many clubs and how to force them to put their houses in order.

Sir Brian Mawhinney, the former Conservative Party chairman and recently-appointed chairman of the Football League, wants to wield the big stick if clubs continue to live beyond their means.

From what I understand, it was proposed that clubs that go into administration could face penalties ranging from a deduction of points to the ultimate sanction...loss of membership of the League.

League chiefs, under Sir Brian's direction, believe that unless penalties are introduced, there is no incentive for clubs to stay within their means.

League spokesman John Nagle said, prior to the meeting: "These proposals will enable clubs to use administration to restructure their businesses but we have to make sure football's finances are put on a firm footing in the long term."

The penalties for ignoring the new regulations, assuming they were given the green light on Thursday, are called 'sporting sanctions' and are quite severe.

Don't forget that no ruling can be made on any proposal until the League's annual general meeting on 5th June.

But if they did receive sufficient support on Thursday, clubs who go into administration twice in three years could have their membership of the Football League withdrawn from the beginning of the next season. In other words, they would be kicked out.

Penalties just for going into administration would range from six and 12-point deductions to automatic relegation and would come into force from the start of the 2004/05 season.

John Nagle says: "This is just the first step in raising the levels of governance within the Football League."

Similar sanctions already apply in various European countries. Clubs in Holland, for instance, must apply annually for a licence which is granted once they have given assurances that they are financially stable.

It could well be that quite a few club chairmen are going to be even nicer to their bank managers in future!

Another important proposal on Thursday concerned the end-of-season play-offs which, sadly, we are not going to be part of this season.

Crystal Palace proposed that, in future, six clubs rather than four should compete in the play-offs for promotion to the Premiership and the First Division, with the first round of games seeing the 5th-placed club hosting the 8th and the 6th hosting the 7th.

The winners would then travel to the grounds of the 3rd or 4th placed sides and the winners would meet in the final.


In the THIRD DIVISION, where three clubs are promoted automatically, the play-offs would involve the clubs from 4th to 9th place.

Back to finance because our accounts, for a two-year period, were released to shareholders last week.

They indicated an operating loss over a two-year period until May 2002 of £146,405.

But our financial director Graham Morris disclosed that for the year ended May 2001 the accounts showed an operating loss of £423,605 and the club actually turned things round and made a profit of £277,200 in the following period of 12 months.

Two record transfer fees, for Clive Platt and Paul Connor, totalling



£250,000, were financed from the proceeds of the ITV Digital deal which was worth £307,000 but has since collapsed, costing the club £119,000 a year.

Our chairman David Kilpatrick says, in his report to the shareholders: 'Regrettably, with the reduction in income from the television companies and the distributions from the Football League, it will be necessary for us to more closely control the contracts issued to players.'

'This is to ensure the club can meet its commitments in the future and avoid the financial difficulties which have beset many of our competitors.'

On the brighter side, of course, Graham Morris told the Rochdale Observer: 'We will make a profit this year because of the cup run and we should be straight at the end of the season.'

You don't have to be a rocket scientist to appreciate that gates of fewer than 2,000 go nowhere near providing enough money to pay the wage bill.

So the turn-out for the local derby against Bury was particularly welcome, even if it was swollen by a big following from down the road.

Bigger crowd, better atmosphere, better performance. Only the result was wrong.

# York drama breaks records


## OUTFIELD KEEPERS

LEE McEvilly's introduction as Dale's replacement goalkeeper at York a fortnight ago (pictured) opened up a real can of worms over previous instances of an outfield player taking over between the sticks.



The most recent occurrence came in our game at Blackpool exactly two years ago. Dale had Neil Edwards sent-off for a professional foul late in the match, but one of the problems was that we had used all of our substitutes, meaning Matthew Gilks was unable to replace him.

David Flitcroft (pictured) had stood-in when 'Taffy' was sent-off at Southend a month earlier, but in the game at Blackpool he was one of the substituted players. Therefore, Michael Oliver took over for the closing moments, and managed to keep out the home strikers.



The last time Dale had to put an outfield player in goal due to injury was back in September 1994 - and again the opposition was Blackpool. The game was an Auto Windscreens Shield tie at Bloomfield Road when striker Paul Williams took over from keeper Chris Clarke, who had received a blow to the head in the 35th minute. Dale went on to win this match 2-1.

Twelve months earlier Martin Hodge was forced off the field in our opening game of the season at Darlington. Steve Whitehall replaced him for the

last five minutes of the first half, before Hodge returned to action after the break.

Back in January 1991 Dale travelled to Edgar Street to face Hereford. This was our first game following Terry Dolan's resignation as manager, meaning Dave Sutton was in temporary charge.

It was a bad start for Sutton, though, as Dale went down to a 2-0 defeat. Hereford's first goal came from a penalty that had been awarded following a professional foul by Keith Welch. The Dale goalkeeper was sent-off by referee David Elleray, leaving full-back Wayne Goodison to keep goal for the remainder of the game.

## GOALSCORING KEEPERS!

MANY Dale supporters were questioning whether Lee McEvilly was the first 'goalkeeper' to score a goal for Rochdale. We dusted down the club's official history to discover that the answer is "No", although you have to go back over 80 years for the evidence. However, it does appear as though 'Evil' is the first goalkeeper to score for Dale whilst wearing the keeper's jersey!

Back in the 1922/23 season goalkeeper Jimmy Crabtree turned out at inside left in a match at Hartlepools. Dale won the game 2-0, with Crabtree netting both goals! A week later we entertained the same opposition at Spotland but Crabtree found himself back between the posts!

It could be argued that Kevin Rose should also have a place in this unique club. When Dale drew 2-2 at Bury in March 1993 Rose powered a header towards goal, and to keen-eyed supporters it looked as though the ball was over the line. Unfortunately the linesman didn't concur, and it was left to Andy Thackeray to take the plaudits with two late goals.

## PENALTY SAVES

WHAT is it about Bootham Crescent and penalty saves? In the last 14 years we have seen four penalties saved on that ground in fixtures between York

and Rochdale. Who recalls the following?

\* September 1989 - Keith Welch saved from Steve Spooner, only for the referee to order a re-take. Spooner scored that time!

\* August 1993 - Martin Hodge kept out Nigel Pepper's spot-kick.

\* January 2002 - Matthew Gilks made a superb stop from Graham Potter's penalty.

\* April 2003 - Michael Ingham saved from Paul Connor and Lee McEvilly. Fortunately 'Evil' blasted home the rebound.

## THREE PENALTY POINTS

THE game at York saw referee Paul Robinson award three penalties, but when did that last happen in a Dale fixture? We reckon it was back in March 1996 when Wigan were the visitors to Spotland. Steve Whitehall took two spot-kicks at the Sandy Lane end - but managed to miss both of them! It was therefore no surprise when Wigan were awarded a penalty of their own which Wayne Biggins converted with aplomb.

Whitehall was also involved in our FA Cup tie at Burnley in December 1993. He scored one penalty, but then missed another less than five minutes later. Soon after that Burnley were awarded a spot-kick, which David Eyres knocked past Martin Hodge to complete the Clares' 4-1 win.

In November 1985 we defeated Wrexham 3-2 at Spotland, with Steve Taylor scoring two penalties for Dale and Steve Charles converting one for the Robins.

And finally, who remembers our game against Doncaster in September 1990? Dale managed to miss just one penalty that afternoon, but the problem was that they did it THREE times! It was a remarkable incident as the referee ordered two re-takes, but neither Wayne Goodison nor Steve O'Shaughnessy could find a way past goalkeeper Paul Crichton



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
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# Gulls impress Spotland faithful Plus... Brassed off by late shirt tug

**TORQUAY** United's 2-0 win at Spotland earlier this month was a terrible experience for everyone connected with Rochdale, but for those from Devon it was the perfect day out.

**'Even Dale fans applaud United'** was the headline in the *Herald Express*, although reporter David Thomas obviously - or deliberately - missed the more sinister reasons behind the accolade afforded to the visitors.

'As Torquay United's team coach left Spotland, a group of Rochdale fans, consoling themselves with a pint outside the Ratcliffe Arms, put down their drinks and applauded the Gulls out of the car park,' wrote Thomas.

'It was the most eloquent tribute to a performance which had been in a different class to anything their own team produced.'

'And while United, a side without a visible weakness on Saturday, can look forward to the most exciting end of season they've known for at least five years, Rochdale are left only with trying to make sure they don't get dragged even deeper into relegation trouble.'

While that is a fair comment from Thomas, we take it he doesn't class Torquay's final day escape from relegation 2001 as 'exciting'.

Thomas continued: 'Only 12 months ago the roles were exactly reversed - United worried about the drop and Dale in the play-offs - which just goes to show how quickly fortunes can change in football.'

Let's hope by next April they have

changed again!

In conclusion Thomas said: 'What made United's performance all the better was that, while Rochdale had a subs' bench that would be hard to beat for experience and/or potential at this level, they had to include two trainees.'

This was always a topic that I intended to avoid this season so as not to annoy our own stewards, but the events at Glanford Park recently means I have to cover the subject. A new entry as the undisputed No. 1 of terrible stewarding and organisation arose when Scunty decided that Dale fans should be situated at one end of their Main Stand ... a bit like Dale used to do when Willbuts Lane was being built.

Not only did you have to queue to buy a ticket at a very small and undermanned office, you then had to queue to get in through one turnstile.

I could just about cope with that, but at the end of the game Dale fans were wanting to get off sharpish in order to try and beat the congestion and get home before 11pm. Amazingly, the Scunty Yellow Peril wouldn't let us out as the designated exit had some of The Iron regulars filtering out through the same gate. Ooh, there was some vicious

stick quite rightly being given out to Yellow Peril.

Quite how Scunthorpe thought that Rochdale's diehards, who have no history of any trouble, would look to start buster with Scunthorpe's elderly 'Main Standers Massive' is beyond me. And, although Yellow Peril insisted he was under orders to keep the gate shut until all the Scunthorpe fans had gone, he then changed his mind and let us out when plenty of home fans were still filling out.

Was there any trouble? Of course not, but this was absolutely terrible organisation which led to placid fans becoming very angry.

Another incident occurred during the recent game at Exeter. Our female travelling colleague was making her first visit to Exeter, and as such she wanted to experience as much of the away end as possible. She was also under the impression that barriers were meant for leaning on in a forward direction. Wrong! As she leaned on a rearmost barrier, she was approached by a fast-moving Yellow Peril. "You can't stand there love," he said in his West Country brogue. "Please move in front of the barrier."

A few minutes later, Chris Beech's wayward shot flew past us and nestled in this 'no mans land'. Everyone took a few seconds to look at the ball before exclaiming "We can't get the ball. We're not allowed behind the barrier."

Yellow Peril showed an unusual degree of initiative and decided to get the ball himself, much to the sarcastic amusement of the Dale contingent.

One of my favourites comes from Carlisle. Dale were playing there in August 1998 and, as Barrow was the manager, Carlisle had only opened one turnstile which about 200 fans had to patiently queue to get through. Many of you won't be acquainted with the hassle of getting to this ground, but basically Albion operate a park-and-ride system for all 6,500 fans, with approximately four buses to do the job. We finally got to the ground and although no steward had done anything wrong, our man went to find one. On doing so he informed him that Albion were infringing on the civil liberties of man and were making what should be a pleasant day out seem more like a trip to Alton Towers.

# Swans treading choppy waters

## Poor Easter leaves relegation doubts

TWO defeats over the Easter weekend have left Swansea City's Football League future hanging in the balance once again. The Swans were beaten at Leyton Orient last Saturday and at home by Exeter on Monday to find themselves a point above the drop zone with just two games to play.

City have been struggling in the lower reaches for the majority of the season. They won just once in their opening 13 fixtures - a 2-0 defeat of Bournemouth on 24th August - and by the onset of winter they were firmly entrenched in the relegation places.

By this time there had been a managerial change at the troubled Welsh club. Player-manager Nick Cusack had overseen the disastrous start to the season, but he left the Vetch Field following a 1-0 loss at Boston in mid-September.

Former Wrexham boss Brian Flynn replaced Cusack and he has slowly improved the Swans' fortunes, despite their still precarious position.

One of Swansea's major problems has been their form on the road. They have collected just two away wins this term - the joint worst record in the Nationwide League - while 13 away fixtures have ended in defeat. Only Southend have lost more away games in Division Three.

Victories in their two remaining matches will see City steer clear of relegation. After today they face Hull at the Vetch Field next Saturday, although the picture could be much clearer by then -


especially with Shrewsbury playing Carlisle in midweek.

Swansea have broken a club record this season by using 36 players in League action. Only two of those have been goalkeepers, with loanee **NEIL CUTLER** currently in pole position. Formerly with Chester and Aston Villa, Cutler helped Stoke gain promotion to Division One last season.

Stalwart **ROGER FREESTONE** - who is second in City's all-time League appearance list - has been relegated to second choice following some time out with a back injury. He has played 529 League games for the club, scoring three goals in the process, and is due a testimonial match against Chelsea in a couple of weeks.

**MICHAEL HOWARD, JASON SMITH** and **ALAN TATE** have been regulars in defence this term. Howard, who is in his fifth season at the Vetch Field, recently made his 200th League appearance for Swansea, while Smith, who had previously played in non-league football, is approaching his 150th League game for the club. Tate joined our visitors on loan from Manchester United in November having had a similar spell in Belgian football last season.

Former trainee **KRISTIAN O'LEARY** is City's longest-serving outfield player, having graduated from trainee status seven years ago. He will be looking for a start today, along with England Under-20 international **LEON HYLTON**, who is on loan from Aston Villa, and former trainee **LEE JENKINS**, who scored on his League

debut in a 4-0 win at Hereford in September 1996.

Other defenders in the squad are former Welsh Under-21 international **TERRY EVANS**, one-time Barry and Merthyr Tydfil centre-half **NEIL SHARP** and third-year trainee **STUART JONES**.

Brian Flynn has overhauled his midfield in recent months, and he now has the right blend of youth and experience in that position. The youth is provided by **LEON BRITTON**, who is on loan from West Ham until the end of the season, while the experience comes from Spaniard **ROBERTO MARTINEZ**, who won the Third Division title with Wigan in 1997, and former Burnley and Bury man **LENNY JOHNROSE**.

Ex-Dale winger **KIERON DURKAN** moved to the Vetch Field in January, but he has only just returned to the squad after a spell out through injury. **ANDREW MUMFORD** and **GARETH PHILLIPS**, who have both represented Wales at Under-21 level, have also been with the first team in recent weeks, while **JONATHAN COATES** rejoined Swansea on transfer deadline day having been released last May by then manager Nick Cusack.

Further midfield options are provided by former Manchester United junior **JAMIE WOOD**, one-time Oxford and Bury schemer **MATT MURPHY** and trainee **ANTONIO CORBISIERO**, who has captained Swansea's Under-19 team this season. The most familiar name in attack is **STEVE WATKIN**, an experienced striker who has now netted over 100 League goals. He spent his early career with Wrexham, playing under the management of his current boss Brian Flynn.

Blackburn Rovers provide two more of Swansea's forward players. **JAMES THOMAS**, who scored against Dale at the Vetch Field in October, joined his home town club last summer. He holds the records for most Welsh caps at Under-21 level, and was recently called-up to the full squad. **MARC RICHARDS**, who played on loan

at Halifax last season, linked-up with our visitors in November, also on a temporary basis.

**JOHN WILLIAMS** was once the winner of a national competition to find the country's quickest footballer, although the years have lessened his pace somewhat. He returned to Swansea two summers ago from Darlington.

Also available in attack are experienced striker **KEVIN NUGENT**, who will be best remembered for spells at Plymouth and Cardiff, and youngsters **JAMIE REWBURY** and **CRAIG STIENS**.

# We have given ourselves a chance

## Karen Bond talks to Brian Flynn

**SWANSEA** City may have spent much of this season in and around the relegation zone, but manager Brian Flynn remains hopeful that an upturn in their fortunes over recent months will be enough to preserve the club's Football League status.

Flynn, who was appointed in September after turning down the Director of Football role five months earlier, is convinced the battle to avoid relegation will go right down to the wire and believes 48 points should guarantee Swansea's survival.

"We have put ourselves in with a good fighting chance," insisted Flynn before defeat at Leyton Orient last weekend left Swansea only two points above the drop zone and having played a game more than two of the three sides below them.

"Our level of consistency has been good. We needed it because with 20 games to go, just under half the season, our goal difference was very, very poor and we needed to alter that."

"We are still the lowest goal scorers in the division, but we were by a long way and that has got better. We have also conceded fewer goals in games and things have turned around."

"The main and important factor

[behind this turn around] is that the players have done what is expected of them. I am enjoying it [at Swansea]. You have got to enjoy it and relish the challenge and that is what we came here for.

"I think mathematically it will not be the case [that we are safe by today]. I hope it is but I don't think it will be. Whatever results there were over the Easter weekend, I think the only teams probably safe are really the ones on the fringes of relegation."

Flynn began his career as an apprentice with Burnley and, with less than a season of first team football behind him, he won the first of his 66 caps for Wales as a 19-year-old substitute against Luxembourg in May 1975.

The 47-year-old joined Leeds United for £250,000 in November 1977 and, having been named Player of the Year in 1978/79, he went on to make 154 League appearances for the club before returning to Burnley in November 1982.

Three years later Flynn moved to Cardiff City and then had spells with Doncaster Rovers (twice), Limerick and Bury before joining Wrexham in February 1988. The Welshman was appointed player-manager in November 1989, initially on a temporary basis.

Flynn retired from playing at the

end of the 1991/92 season and went onto become Wrexham's longest-serving manager, having been in charge for more than 600 matches before his departure in September 2001.

What then is Flynn, who took Wrexham into the European Cup Winners' Cup as Welsh Cup winners, expecting from today's encounter at Spotland Stadium?

"They were up there at the start, early in the season, and slipped slightly," concluded Flynn. "They had a good cup run and have got some good young players. I think they may be a force next season...and Swansea too."



## DID YOU KNOW?

OUR first two League games against Swansea took place on 15th April 1968 and 16th April 1968!

ROCHDALE lost their first five League games against Swansea.

DALE'S 3-0 defeat at Swansea in December 1968 was followed by an unbeaten run of 15 League games, which eventually led to promotion.

DALE'S first victory over The Swans came in our ninth meeting - Reg Jenkins, Jack Howarth and Peter Gowans scoring in a 3-2 win at the Vetch Field in September 1972.

IN February 1978 Swansea appointed legendary Liverpool and Wales striker John Toshack as their new manager. His first game was a 2-1 defeat at Spotland.

IN November 1986, on-loan Leeds' striker Lyndon Simmonds (pictured) scored Swansea's goal in their 1-0 home defeat of Dale....

## Man City fan strips to his shorts

**ROCHDALE supporters bring us their personal memories of previous games against today's visitors ...**

**Richard Wild:** The kiosk in the away end at Swansea is very peculiar. It is the shape of a coffee jar, and is behind a wire fence. It makes you almost scared to ask for anything for fear of having your head bitten off. I also recall that on my first few trips there they didn't sell coffee. Bizarre!

I've also visited Swansea on numerous occasions and we very rarely seem to win. The only time I haven't been in recent times was when Steve Parkin was manager and we won 1-0. Paul Connor's goal there earlier this season is also something to remember, plus it's so bloody far home after we've lost.

**Clive Armstrong, Whitworth:** I had been watching Dale for quite a few years before I got the chance to go to Swansea. I had seen the Vetch Field on TV when Swansea were in the old First Division, but I had also read something in a book - probably one of those ground guides - about this bloke who used to watch games from the top of a ladder.

So when I eventually went to 'The Vetch' in August 1996, my first task was to look for this chap. Sure enough, there he was at the far end of the ground, his head poking proudly over the top of the wall. Maybe he was in the Free Ladder Gang!

Anyway, when we played at Swansea in October he wasn't there! I have three theories on this: (1) He has died; (2) He has had his ladder confiscated, or (3) He decided Swansea weren't worth watching! If any Swansea fans reading this know who I'm talking about, can they inform the programme editor!

**Mark Wilbraham:** One of my most vivid memories of Swansea is when we played them at Spotland towards the end of the 1986/87 season. Dale were battling against relegation from the

League and it was vital we won our home games - I think we had three to play. Swansea visited on a Wednesday night and the Rochdale weather was true to form - it bucketed it down! Dale were leading 1-0 at half-time, but the pitch was becoming more waterlogged by the minute. I was stood by the tunnel during the interval, and I recall the referee, who was future Premiership whistler Gerald Ashby, coming out to have a look at the worsening conditions.

Suddenly, one old-time Dale fan shouted to him: "If tha' calls off this game, th'll never get out of here in one piece!"

The ref. obviously took this advice to heart as the game continued and Dale won 2-0. Not only that, but he also gave us a penalty!

**Basil Cryer, Dearnley:** I think we played Swansea here in our last home game about four years ago. My abiding memory of that game is of a Swansea fan climbing onto the roof of the Willbutts Lane stand and waving his Welsh flag violently and proudly. And the annoying thing was that he was allowed to do it completely unchallenged!

**Jim Delsey, Hamer:** I have a great memory of a game against Swansea. It was May 1999 and it was our last home game of the season. We lost 3-0 and everyone skulked home in a depressed state of mind. The depression continued until about 10 o'clock on Sunday morning when I received a phone call. "He's gone," came the voice of a friend.

"Who has?" I queried.  
"Barrow," replied my mate. "They've sacked him."

I whooped with delight at the thought of no more Barrowball. And then I wondered why it had taken so long!

**Colin Howarth, Norden:** Back in the mid-1990s a friend of mine suddenly decided that he wanted to come to Swansea for the first game of the season. This was a strange decision as he

was a Man City fan and I couldn't quite fathom out why he was prepared to travel all that way to a neutral game.

Those of you who were there will recall that it was a baking hot day. My friend, who had missed out on his summer holiday due to it clashing with the Dog and Partridge's FC end-of-season 'do', decided he wanted to get a bit of a tan. So, on entering the away end he made his way down to the front few rows of the terrace so as not to be shielded from the sun by the cavernous roof.
