

WREXHAM - PEN PICS

CHRIS ARMSTRONG (Forward)

Returned to the Racecourse in the summer of 2003 when signing on a free from Bolton Wanderers. The Newcastle born forward was brought up in Wrexham and joined us from a local amateur team in 1989. Over the next two years he scored 13 goals in 40 starts and his blinding pace persuaded Millwall to sign him for £50,000. Twelve months later the fee had gone up to £1m and with it a switch to Crystal Palace, where he scored 45 goals in 118 league appearances. This record earned him a transfer to Spurs in a £4.5m deal and despite injury problems at White Hart Lane, he returned 48 goals in 117 Premiership starts, plus 10 more in 15 League Cup games. Bolton Wanderers was his next stop in 2002 and after just one game for the Trotters, he was happy to accept a deal from the Red Dragons.

DEAN BENNETT (Winger)

The 26-year-old was a trainee at West Bromwich Albion when Denis Smith took over at the Hawthorns in 1997, but found himself released later that summer. After a spell with Bromsgrove Rovers, he stepped up to Kidderminster Harriers and helped them win promotion to the Football League in his first season at Aggborough. A regular in the side since, he was a little surprised to find out that Denis was interested in signing him on again, some seven years later, but jumped at the chance to step up a division.

BRIAN CAREY (Centre-Half)


A case of third time lucky for Wrexham, as the big Republic of Ireland international finally joined the Reds on a permanent transfer in 1996. Twice the Cork born centre-half had been on loan at the Racecourse, but on both previous occasions Wrexham could not raise the cash needed to buy him from Manchester United. He eventually joined Leicester City in 1993, but after three seasons at Filbert Street the Reds finally got their man. Injuries and suspensions blighted Brian's campaign two years ago and then a knee operation was required following the opening game of the 2002/03 season. More than played a captain's role in the campaign in leading the team to promotion in 2003.

MATTY CROWELL (Midfielder)

After a successful youth career with his home town team Swansea City, Matty was among a number of Welsh youngsters taken to the south coast of England by Southampton. Despite rising from the Youth team to being a regular member of the Saints' reserve side, as well as representing Wales at various age levels, he saw his chances of a first team place blocked. Recommended to Denis Smith, Matty arrived on trial at the end of the 2002/03 season and impressed the manager enough to be offered a deal for the current season.

ANDY DIBBLE (Goalkeeper)

A detailed history of Andy's career would fill a

programme on its own, but safe to say that the South Welsh has not missed on much in the last 20 years. Starting with Cardiff City, he made his name with Luton Town and won a League Cup medal with them. There were numerous ports of call during loan spells throughout the Football League and Scotland, and he also enjoyed a lengthy spell with Manchester City. Rangers signed him and he made his debut against Celtic, while also seeing service with non-league and League of Wales teams. After two seasons with Stockport County, Denis Smith saw him as the man to help Wrexham out in 2002 and to bring through our younger keepers, as coaching is another avenue of the game that Andy would like to pursue.

CARLOS EDWARDS (Winger)

Joined the club three years ago from Defence Force FC, Trinidad, when signed along with Hector Sam. A current international player for his country, Carlos was involved in their epic World Cup victories over Canada, Panama and Mexico, which saw T&T through to the last round of qualification for 2002 finals. A tricky winger, who can operate on either flank, he has added considerably to the manager's attacking options. Came to the fore in 2002/03 and was one of the club's most consistent players, weighing in with some spectacular goals on our way to promotion. This resulted in his selection to the Divisional Team of the Year, a feat he repeated last season.


DARREN FERGUSON (Midfielder)

Initially signed on a short-term contract following his return from a spell in Dutch football with Sparta Rotterdam in September 1999, Darren later committed himself to an extended stay at the Racecourse and has just agreed a new two-year deal with the club. Born in Glasgow, he joined Manchester United as a youngster and progressed through their system to eventually turn professional in 1990. After several years and five caps for the Scotland Under-21 side, Darren moved for £250,000 to Wolverhampton Wanderers in January 1994. A regular in the Wolves team for five seasons, he did have one spell out due to injury. In February 1999, he took up an option to play in Holland, but decided against extending his stay after helping Sparta avoid relegation. His first goal for Wrexham was our FA Cup winner against Middlesbrough in another third round



giantkilling. Shares the captain's responsibilities with Brian Carey.

BEN FOSTER (Goalkeeper)

Joined the club on loan in January 2005 to cover for the injured Andy Dibble, having worked his way up through the ranks at Stoke City, but currently finding himself as third choice at the Britannia Stadium. Yet to make his debut for the Potters, he had a loan spell with Bristol City last season, but had to wait until joining Kidderminster Harriers before Christmas 2004 to get his first team bow. That came with consecutive matches against Shrewsbury Town and Boston United for Kiddie, but he was then recalled to Stoke after an injury to Ed de Goey. Ben was only too happy to jump at the chance to join Wrexham in January and was thrust straight into the starting line-up for our LDV Vans Trophy tie at Hereford United. Four days later he made his home debut and kept the club's first cleansheet in 20 league games and only the third of the season when facing Doncaster Rovers.

SCOTT GREEN (Midfielder)

Originally joined Wrexham from Wigan in March 2003 and helped the club earn promotion two months later. Turned down a deal to join Telford United, but with their demise has been with a team since the summer. He asked to come training again with Wrexham in October and has progressed so well, that he signed non-contracts in November and returned to the first team to help us win at Huddersfield Town. This has since led to him signing full-time until the end of the season.

ANDY HOLT (Winger)

One of five new signings in the summer of 2004, he joined from Hull City after spending most of last season on the bench as Peter Taylor's Tigers headed for promotion. A former Oldham Athletic player, who can operate in several positions on the left hand side of the team, he is hoping to see more action at the Racecourse than he did at the KC Stadium. As well as his all round play, his long throw ins will be an added weapon for the Red Dragons.

MARK JONES (Midfielder)

Locally born youngster who was promoted to the first team squad last season and has now earned himself a professional deal. Mark was also called up by Jimmy Shoulder to be part of the Wales U21 squad for the opening match in their qualifying group away to Finland and he has since been included against Italy and Azerbaijan. There followed a place on the bench against Bradford City in the Worthington

Cup and a sub appearance against Exeter City in 2002/03. Out following a hernia operation, he has returned to the action and will be looking to push on in the months ahead.

MICHAEL JONES (Goalkeeper)

Now our regular substitute keeper, following the departure of Matt Baker to Milton Keynes Dons. The 16-year-old Liverpool born stopper has made rapid progress through the club's youth ranks and even though still a first-year trainee is well thought of by the management team. Made his debut as a second half substitute at Chesterfield in January 2005

DENNIS LAWRENCE (Centre-Half)

Signed in March 2001 from the Defence Force club in Trinidad, Dennis stands at 6'7" and will not be hard to spot if selected. A seasoned performer on the international stage, Dennis had trials with both Newcastle United and Bolton Wanderers, before settling on Wrexham and joining up with our two other T&T signings. After taking a little time to settle, he forced his way into the side and is now an established member of the team, who weighs in with his fair share of goals.

CHRIS LLEWELLYN (Forward)

Growing up in south Wales, Chris was spotted by scouts from Norwich City and came through the ranks at Carrow Road before being offered a full time deal by the Canaries. He was making steady progress in East Anglia and even finished one season as their second top goalscorer that was until injury sidelined him in 2001. Fit again, he found it difficult to break back into the Norwich line-up and after starting either on the wing or more often on the bench, he took the opportunity to join Bristol Rovers on loan in February 2003. An extended run with the Gas, which included two goals against Wrexham, alerted Denis Smith and the following summer Chris left Norwich to return to Wales. Already a full international and a former captain of the U21 side, he is looking forward to playing as striker once again and getting regular first team football.

LEVI MACKIN (Midfielder)

A youth team player who has now made his senior debut and become a regular in the first team squad, although usually on the bench. Hails from Chester, but has been with the club since a schoolboy and worked his way up through the system.

CRAIG MORGAN (Centre-Half)

Still only 18 years of age, Colwyn Bay born Craig made his first team debut last season and

when scoring at Cambridge United, made the record books by being the youngest Football League scorer in the club's history. He has been a regular in the reserves for two seasons and in the summer was offered a full professional contract. Called up by Wales at U19 level and on standby for the U21s, the central defender looks to have a bright career ahead of him in the game.

ALEX SMITH (Winger)

Signed from rivals Chester City in the summer of 2004, Alex is a former Everton trainee who has since travelled around the Football League in a career that has also taken in Swindon, Huddersfield, Reading, Port Vale and Shrewsbury. A regular in the Chester line-up that was heading for the Conference title last season, he missed the last two months through injury. Made an immediate impact with the Red Dragons, earning himself a spot in midfield alongside Darren Ferguson a reputation for his constant supply of long-range passes. A knee injury picked up in a reserve team game at Shrewsbury Town in November meant a cartilage operation and a spell on the sidelines.

SIMON SPENDER (Defender)

Locally born 18-year-old who is in his second year as a Scholar with the club, but already made his first team debut, coming on as substitute at Plymouth in March and helping the team to a 0-0 against the Division Two leaders. He has since enjoyed a full debut and looks likely to become a regular member of the senior squad very shortly. A Wales U20 international, he was also in the recent U21 training camp held at Wrexham.

SHAUN PEJC (Defender)

Made his debut at Port Vale in 2001, but had to wait until a visit to Peterborough United in January 2002 for his second appearance in a Wrexham shirt. Retained his place over the next few weeks, until a dead leg sidelined him. His performances were enough to earn him a full professional contract and he will be sure to see more action in the season ahead. Qualifying to play for Wales through family connections, he is now an established member of the U21 side, after making his debut away to Finland in September 2002.

STEVE ROBERTS (Defender)

Now a regular member of the first team, Steve scored his first goal for the club with the opener at Kettering, in a televised FA Cup first round replay in 1999. A broken leg at Oxford the following season kept him on the sidelines for 12 months, but now back to full fitness he continues to show just why manager Denis Smith offered him a three-year contract. A Welsh U21 international, he was called up to the senior squad in May 2003 for a friendly in the USA, but had to miss out due to an operation on a heel injury. Made his first team debut in October 1998, in a Welsh Premier Cup game with Swansea City, lining up alongside brother

Neil, to become the eighth pair of brothers to have turned out for the club. Born in Wrexham, Steve came through the junior ranks at the Racecourse and has established himself at centre half with over 100 appearances for the club.

HECTOR SAM (Forward)

The third of our Trinidadians, he signed in 2001. Played for a team in Port of Spain and has been capped by his country at several levels including full international. Only 23, he opened his account for Wrexham with a goal in his first game, a friendly against Sheffield Wednesday. Not the tallest of strikers, Hector certainly has pace and has already proved himself more than a handful for opposing defenders. Six goals in his first seven competitive matches was an impressive return and saw him called up to the T&T side for their World Cup games against Mexico and Panama. Under Denis Smith, Hector has rediscovered his form, whether it be scoring or setting up goals.

JUAN UGARTE (Forward)

Initially signed non-contract forms after having a trial with Liverpool. The 24-year-old former Real Sociedad striker has been with a number of second division clubs in Spain, but last summer came to the UK to try his luck in the Football League. Originally signed with Dorchester Town, scoring six goals in seven games, he then moved on Anfield as his best friend is Alonso. Came to Wrexham in October and has impressed, initially with the Reserves and then when he got his chance in the first team. Now signed a contract until the end of the season and scored our winning goal at Chester City in the LDV Vans Trophy to make himself an instant hero.

JIM WHITLEY (Midfielder)

Joined the Racecourse staff on non-contract terms in October 2001, after an abortive attempt was made to sign him in the previous summer. Released by Manchester City a season ago, Jim is a Northern Ireland international who was raised in Wrexham before learning his trade with City. He has also been on loan to several teams over the years including Norwich City and Northampton Town, but found himself a new role as full back with the Red Dragons. After winning the club's 2001/02 Player of the Season trophy, he signed a contract that will take him through until the end of the present season.

DANNY WILLIAMS (Midfielder)

Locally born, he started out with Liverpool and won Wales U21 caps while at Anfield. He then moved onto Wrexham and established himself as a first teamer at the Racecourse before then manager Brian Flynn released him to Kidderminster Harriers. An important player at Aggborough under Jan Molby, Danny decided he wanted to return closer to his roots when his contract expired and headed home in the summer to be reunited with the Red Dragons.

Welcome to the Vetch Field for the last competitive match ever to be played at what has been our home for the past 93 years.

WREXHAM 'DREAM TEAM'

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS selects a post-war Wrexham 'Dream Team' with the help of several Wrexham supporters and club officials.

Dai Davies Welsh international goalkeeper who was capped 28 times while at Wrexham. Signing professional for Swansea in August 1969, he moved to Everton in December 1970 and gained top-flight experience prior to joining Wrexham in September 1977. He starred in their 1977-78 Third Division title and Welsh Cup 'double' triumph and was ever-present in 1980-81, making 144 League appearances before returning to Swansea in July 1981. Subsequently with Tranmere Rovers, Bangor City and Wrexham again, he has since worked for BBC Radio Wales and Radio Cymru as well as running a natural healing centre.

Joey Jones Welsh international full-back who gained a club record 29 caps while at the Racecourse Ground. Signing professional for Wrexham in January 1973, he starred in their 1973-74 FA Cup run and 1975 Welsh Cup final success. He moved to Liverpool for £110,000 in July 1975 and featured in their 1976-77 League Championship and European Cup 'double', rejoining Wrexham for £210,000 in October 1978. Reunited with John Neal at Chelsea in October 1982, he moved via Huddersfield Town back to Wrexham in August 1987 and netted 19 goals in 375 League games before joining their coaching staff.

Alan Dwyer Versatile left-back who starred in Wrexham's 1977-78 Third Division title and Welsh Cup 'double' success. Signing professional at the Racecourse Ground in October 1973, he displaced Dave Fogg in Wrexham's defence and featured prominently in the 1976-77 promotion near-miss. He also helped Wrexham reach the FA Cup and League Cup quarter-finals in 1977-78 and scored twice in 180 League games before moving to Stockport County in October 1981, then played for Bangor City, Oswestry Town, Runcorn and Chirk AAA. Still living in the Wrexham area, he has since worked as a lorry driver.

Barry Horne Midfielder who was capped 59 times by Wales after leaving Wrexham. A latecomer to professional football, he played for Rhyl while completing chemistry and engineering degrees at Liverpool University and joined Wrexham in June 1984. He was twice ever-present and starred in the 1986 Welsh Cup final triumph, netting 16 goals in 136 League games before moving to Portsmouth in July 1987. Sold to Southampton for £700,000 in March 1989, he joined Everton in July 1992 and was an FA Cup winner in 1995. He later played for Birmingham, Huddersfield, Sheffield Wednesday, Kidderminster and Walsall.

John Roberts Former Welsh international central defender who was a key figure in Wrexham's 1977-78 Third Division title and Welsh Cup success. Signing professional for Swansea in July 1964, he switched to defence after moving to Northampton Town in November 1967 and joined Arsenal in May 1969. He was a member of their 1970-71 'double' squad and moved to Birmingham City in October 1972, then Wrexham in August 1976. Featuring in two ECWC campaigns, he netted five goals in 145 League games prior to joining Hull City in August 1980 where injury ended his career. He owns designer wear shops in Cheshire.

Gareth Davies Welsh international central defender who was ever-present skipper in Wrexham's 1977-78 Third Division title triumph. Previously with Llandudno Town and Colwyn Bay, he moved to the Racecourse Ground in April 1967 and made his League debut in Wrexham's 2-0 defeat against Bradford City ten

months later. He starred in the 1969-70 promotion success and three Welsh Cup final wins as well as four ECWC campaigns. Also featuring in Wrexham's 1973-74 and 1977-78 FA Cup runs, he scored nine times in 489 League games before retiring in May 1983 and now runs the Trefor Park Hotel in Wrexham.

Mickey Thomas Welsh international midfielder who was capped 11 times while at the Racecourse Ground. Signing professional for Wrexham in April 1972, he starred in successive Cup runs and was a key figure in the 1977-78 Third Division title triumph. He moved to Manchester United for £300,000 in November 1978 and featured in the 1979 FA Cup final, joining Everton in August 1981. Following spells at Brighton, Stoke, Chelsea, West Brom, Shrewsbury, Leeds and Stoke again, he rejoined Wrexham in July 1991 and scored in the 1991-92 FA Cup defeat of Arsenal. He has since worked as a match summariser.

Mel Sutton Influential midfielder who was ever-present in Wrexham's 1977-78 Third Division title and Welsh Cup 'double' success. A former Aston Villa amateur, 'Sutty' joined Cardiff City in December 1967 and featured in two Welsh Cup final triumphs and their 1970-71 ECWC run. He moved to the Racecourse Ground in July 1972, starring as Wrexham twice reached the FA Cup quarter-finals and were ECWC quarter-finalists in 1975-76. Scoring 21 goals in 360 League games, he assisted Arfon Griffiths before succeeding him as Wrexham's manager. He later played for Crewe and has since run a newsagents.

Dixie McNeil Striker who starred in Wrexham's 1977-78 Third Division title campaign. Initially with Leicester City, he had spells with Exeter City, Corby Town, Northampton Town and Lincoln City prior to joining Hereford United in August 1974. He was top scorer in their 1975-76 Third Division title triumph and moved to Wrexham in September 1977, also featuring in that season's FA Cup run. Netting 54 goals in 167 League games before returning to Hereford in October 1982, he later managed Wrexham between April 1985 and October 1989. He became Coventry City's coach and has since worked as a book salesman.

Graham Whittle Long-serving striker who was top scorer in Wrexham's 1977-78 Third Division title triumph. Signing professional at the Racecourse Ground in July 1971, he formed a notable partnership with Billy Ashcroft as Wrexham reached the ECWC quarter-finals in 1975-76. He featured in three Welsh Cup final wins and the FA Cup runs of 1973-74 and 1977-78, netting 91 goals in 306 League games for Wrexham before a knee injury ended his League career. Moving to Bangor City in August 1981, he subsequently had spells with Oswestry and Caerwys while working as a milkman in the Wrexham area.

Arfon Griffiths Welsh international midfielder who set Wrexham's appearance record during two spells at the Racecourse Ground. Signing professional for Wrexham in May 1959, he featured in the 1960 Welsh Cup final win and moved to Arsenal in February 1961. He rejoined Wrexham in September 1962 and was a key figure in the 1962-63 and 1969-70 promotion campaigns. Also starring in successive Cup runs, he became player-boss in May 1977 and plotted the 1977-78 Third Division title triumph. He netted 120 goals in 591 League games before resigning in June 1981 and then managed Crewe Alexandra.




