

SWIMMING IN SWANSEA BAY - EDITORIAL

Welcome to the first issue of the brand new Swansea City fanzine 'Swimming in Swansea Bay'. In this little publication, we hope to bring you news, views and maybe even exclusives relating to the Swans. It will feature serious articles and other bits and pieces (with a sense of humour not too far away) at all times.

In the first editorial, we make a passionate plea to our chairman, Mr Doug Sharpe, to spell out the exact financial situation of the club. We have no wish to jump in with the knife and criticise, we would just like to see the facts.

After all, it was Mr Sharpe who saved the club in the mid-eighties. If it wasn't for his survival package, we would probably be subjected to the same standard of soccer seen in Newport these days and that's very sad. Visitors to the Vetch since those dark days have included Liverpool, Tottenham, Monaco, Panathinaikos and of course our friends from Cardiff. Newport haven't been so fortunate!!

On the other hand, life goes on and Mr Sharpe can't rest on his laurels and keep saying "I saved the Swans". Supporters pay good money when going through the turnstiles and the last thing we want to see is rubbish. Hopefully the money we spend at the ground can be used to strengthen the side so that we'll see some decent players representing the club.

This is now our fourth season in Division Three since our promotion in May 1988 and apart from a brief flirtation with the top of the table during the first half of 1988/89 we haven't even once been close to the play-offs when the final ball of the season has been kicked. Support has been dwindling in that time and we have been near to relegation on more than one occasion. The patience of the fans is being tried and many are unhappy with the situation. A lot of long-term die hard supporters are turning their backs on the club and not bothering to turn up anymore:

Just look at the transfer situation since the end of last season. Over half a million pounds has been accrued with the sale of Coleman to Crystal Palace in the summer followed by this season's sales of Connor to Bristol City and Bracey to Halifax Town. During this same period, several new faces have been brought into the first team at a cost of just over £100,000. Considering the financial constraints he has been placed under, Frank Burrows has done a marvellous job this season. When he arrived last March, he inherited Yorath's side, but this term has put together his own very capable but inconsistent team, spending next to nothing in the process.

Shrewd purchases have included Freestone, Ford, Agboola, Williams and fit-again Cornforth, while youngsters like Chapple, Bowen and Jenkins have been blooded. Some of the 'deadwood' (I've heard that term before somewhere!!) that was already here have either been sold or dropped (or joined the Police force). The remaining players (i.e. Gilligan, Harris, Walker, Coughlin and Legg - maybe Raynor) have all played their part in some better performances of late, not forgetting the loan signings of Brazil, Purnell and Beauchamp.

This is good management, but Burrows and the fans know that we are still short of quality players. At least two more class players are needed to form the basis of a sound squad.

With only about a dozen or so league games to go it must be done NOW Mr Sharpe. Already, we've been knocked out of the Welsh Cup by a far inferior club!! Even if the transfer ban (enforced on the club because of the Paul Miller situation) does continue, we must at least sign a few players on loan with the possibility of a permanent deal at the end? Signings MUST be made!!

A play-off place is still possible, but realistically the chance has been missed. Avoiding relegation could turn out to be the main challenge by the end of the season if results go against us.

Next year HAS to be the year we improve. We are now classed as a 'basement' Third Division club which isn't very flattering. We were actually installed as favourites for the drop last August which isn't a very good image for the club. The City of Swansea deserves better, MUCH better!!

As stated earlier Mr Sharpe, the fans have been very loyal up until now, but how long will it last? Crowds will soon be diving below the 2,000 mark. This would be nothing short of disastrous as, potentially, we must be one of the biggest clubs in the division. It hurts to say it, but at least Rick Wright seems to be creating an atmosphere of optimism and hope at Ninian Park, even though we all know it's a load of hype!!

The Second Division must be a target. Whether the new Premier League is a long-term goal is another matter, but <u>money must be spent</u>. The proposed North Stand is an important and expensive project but the playing side must not be forgotten and <u>money must be spent</u>. If you care about the club Mr Sharpe, listen to the fans for once and please reply to us and put forward your point of view. The editors of this fanzine will give you all the space you require. Now's your chance to address the public of Swansea.

ALAN DAVIES

The first page in this fanzine must be put aside to pay our respects to Swans' midfielder Alan Davies following his recent tragic death. Everything that can be said already has been said in the media by Doug Sharpe, Terry Yorath, his playing friends at the club and many more football personalities, although Frank Burrows was understandably too upset to make any comment.

At this time, everyone's thoughts must be with his family. It will take a long time for them to come to terms with this tragedy and it'll probably be with them for the rest of their lives.

Alan had a successful playing career which included representing his country eleven times and winning an F.A.Cup winners medal in 1983 for Manchester United. Ray Wilkins even said that he was the star of the final. All Jacks will have their own memories of Alan. He was a very skilful player who, on his day, could control the whole game. He could certainly find the net as he scored many goals over the years.



One goal which stands out for me was his effort from a free-kick against Cardiff City on Boxing Day 1988. As one of many who was still outside the ground ten minutes after kick-off, it was a little frustrating to enter the ground and find ourselves two goals down to the old enemy. Things seemed lost, but after winning a free-kick just outside the penalty area, Alan stood next to the ball and swerved in a perfect shot with the outside of his right foot which hit the top corner of the net, giving the keeper no chance. This brought us back into the game which we eventually drew 2-2.

That single incident just shows the footballing ability he possessed. Terry Yorath summed it all up by saying:

"Alan was the most creative Welsh player I have ever worked with".

One final and sad comment must go to that dickhead from Cardiff, Mr Rick Wright. He was quoted in the press as saying that the Swansea-Cardiff Welsh Cup Quarter-Final game should have gone ahead on the original date, despite Alan's death 24 hours earlier. The players had only been told the devastating news of their team-mate only 10 hours before kick-off and were obviously too shocked and distraught to even contemplate playing that evening. So next time you even think of saying something moronic like that to the media again Rick, just shut your gob and keep it to yourself - and that's putting it politely!!

There's nothing a soccer-loving Jack likes to see more than our blue neighbours down the M4 making fools of themselves yet again in one way or another. They say that football is a funny old game (well Saint and Greavsie do anyway) and that statement was justified on Saturday 25th January. Wrexham had a superb result at West Ham in the F.A.Cup and even the Blue Turds scored four. Newport AFC scored a last-minute winner at home to Nuneaton and both Merthyr and Barry remained unbeaten (because they didn't play!).

The biggest turnaround had to be at The Hawthorns. It had to be seen to be believed. We started the game well with some neat football but fell behind to two Graham 'Grecian 2 million' Roberts goals, one a 30-yard rocket and the other a penalty. The Swans went off at half-time to the chant of "What a load of rubbish" by irate travelling Jacks.

The watching Everton team couldn't have been too impressed with our second half performance when we could have gone five or six down, but for the erratic finishing of Gary Bannister and other Albion players. Ex-Albion favourite Cyrille Regis, who was also in the stand watching the game, must have been wishing that he was playing against our leaky defence (which normally isn't too bad).

Raynor was replaced by Chalmers - Judith is so slow - and Thornber replaced the late Alan Davies. Steve had said to the 'Gaffer' (Frankie), which must be the quote of the year, "Stick me on and I'll get you a goal". Considering he had only scored I league goal in the previous six seasons with Halifax and the Swans, he must obviously be a bit of a optimist! The sound of the Anti-Doug songs and "Andrew Legg is a homosexual" were still ringing round The Hawthorns when Thornber struck his first. The rest is history. In the last 13 minutes, a 2-0 deficit was turned into a 3-2 win with Steve getting a hattrick, but a lot of the credit must go to Johnny Williams who was involved in all three goals, the last of which was scored at about 4.50 pm.

(The Everton players were so shell-shocked at our comeback that they lost the day after in their F.A.Cup clash with Chelsea at Stamford Bridge).

What made this day even crazier was the fact that over a thousand Albion fans stayed behind until six o'clock to demonstrate about the Chairman and the Board of Directors. Manager Bobby Gould was forced onto the pitch by the Board to address the fans who were still on the terraces. A microphone was distributed to the angry fans who questioned Gould about the running of the club. He is now known as 'Kilroy' in the dressing room because of his interviewing techniques (and as the name of the Chairman is John Silk, they make a good partnership - Kilroy Silk!!).

The situation at West Brom is similar to ours in that they sold striker Don Goodman to Sunderland for £900,000, but as expected in these days of money-grabbing directors, most of this hadn't been ploughed back into strengthening the playing side. Considering the way they played against the Swans (apart from the closing 13 minutes) and as they were 3rd in the table at the time, a lot of onlookers thought that the fans were too impatient and spoilt as it was a freak result. With hindsight, their action was really well timed, as a few days later they bought striker Bob Taylor from Bristol City for around £300,000 who then scored the first goal in their 2-0 win over promotion rivals Brentford the following Saturday. At the time of writing, the Baggies had reached pole position in the division. Perhaps this may be a message to Jacks in future games.

ANSWER - When he/she wears a football shirt not depicting the Swans badge.



JACKS ON LOAN


Since that ill-fated and depressing period of the mid-1980's when Dougie bailed the Swans out of financial disaster, we have made full use of the loan system. This obviously suits Dougie as it avoids paying a fat fee to a club plus an even fatter signing-on fee to the player.

Some gems have come and gone, and in some cases they wanted to sign for the club. On the other hand, there have been some players we've been glad to get rid of. Here is a run-down of the loan signings since the re-birth of the Swans in the Summer of '86.

1986-87

Pontypool-born LYNDON SIMMONDS was the first to arrive when he came in October to play alongside Sean 'McMiss' McCarthy while Ian Love was injured. He was a very stocky player who made Mark Hughes' legs look like the dancer Wayne Sleep in his tights. PAUL ATKINSON was a capable midfielder with a 'cultured' left-foot. He arrived from his second spell with Oldham Athletic (obviously they didn't rate him) and scored 3 goals in 18 games. His debut was at Ninian Park on Boxing Day and eventually stayed until the end of the season. Signed for Burnley later on. STEVE LOVELL, an exiled Jack by birth, played two games in February. He scored in one and also starred in that famous 1-0 victory over then-invincible Northampton Town. Since then, his strike rate has been phenomenal for Gillingham, scoring 75 league goals in 5 seasons.

1987-88



One of the most disastrous loan signings of all time was Geordie 'goalkeeper' PETER GUTHRIE. He was brought to the Vetch from Spurs to replace the unfortunate Michael Hughes who was forced to retire from the game. It was laughable sometimes watching him keep goal as he looked so awkward. He did save us when it mattered down in Torquay with two superb saves in the last 10 minutes that assured us promotion in that vital play-off. After a wellpublicised row with Ray Clemence (and never making a single appearance for Tottenham) he moved to (then) nonleague Barnet before coming back to the league with AFC Bournemouth. He made 10 appearances for the South Coast club last season but probably won't make many more. Hope the fans at Dean Court had as many laughs and nail-biting moments as we did!!

1988-89

From one extreme to the other. RHYS WILMOT was one of the most popular figures at the Vetch during his stint early in the season. A brilliant keeper who was previously wasting away in the Arsenal reserves (with Jason Ball), he moved onto Plymouth where he was eventually signed on a permanent contract. It seems that every week we read about Rhys playing out of his skin. This was one big cock-up Doug, not to sign him. Another cracking player that came and went before we could say Ray Kennedy (and definitely before Ray could say it) was DEAN HOLDSWORTH. He hadn't really established himself at Watford when he came on loan to us, scoring I goal in 5 league games. After leaving the Vetch, he went on loan to Brentford for a few games before moving back to Watford. Brentford saw his talent and snapped him up and he's been hitting the net regularly ever since. May now be in the £I million bracket.

This was certainly a great season for leaving sound players go as DAVID PUCKETT arrived and scored 3 goals in 8 league games (including one against the Scum). After initially making his name with hometown club Southampton, he has since moved on to Aldershot in the 4th Division, where he has been leading the goalscoring charts. Finally, COLIN WEST, a short but nippy striker, arrived from Chelsea and scored a few goals towards the end of the season. Unfortunately, his stay coincided with the demise of our play-off hopes when we didn't produce one win in the last 12 league games of the season. Was previously on loan to Partick Thistle and I think he returned there for more torture before eventually moving on to Dundee. They are currently battling it out at the top of the 1st Division.

1989-90

Two loan signings greeted the start of this season. GARY COBB played 5 games wide on the right (that guy really hogged the touchline) and went back to Luton. Fulham signed him but they were probably sorry too. JOHN SALAKO was a different story. This was probably the only good thing Ian Evans did during his year-long stay. This babyfaced Nigerian-born striker had gifted feet and starred in Greece (just like John Travolta). Obviously Steve Coppell saw his talent and whisked him back to Crystal Palace. He has since become a full England international and TV presenter but badly injured his knee earlier this season playing for Palace against Leeds. We all wish John a speedy recovery. Yet another goalkeeper arrived in September and was again a Newport lad. ROGER FREESTONE made 14 league appearances and looked a good, solid keeper. He was third choice behind Beasant and Hitchcock at Chelsea and that must have been thrilling (get it - Hitchcock!!).

1990-91

CHRIS HONOR, a defender from Bristol City played 2 league games during the cold spell of January and February. He made no impact whatsoever apart from everyone realising he was a real poseur. In his spell at the Vetch, David netted 3 in 12 games and played some good football both on the right side and the centre of midfield. He was one of the boys and most Jacks would have liked to have seen him sign for the Swans. Paul was a Scouser who had been with Sunderland from school but made only 3 league appearances in 3 seasons. He slotted in well at right-back (anyone would slot in well after replacing David Hough and the afore-mentioned Chris Honor). Penney and Williams played in that great day out at the National Stadium and both were seen chanting 'Jack Army' (during the game as well as after!).

1991-92

Onto the present season and we've seen our fair share of loan players so far. DEREK BRAZIL (Man Utd) and JOEY BEAUCHAMP (Oxford) have both come and gone. Derek badly wanted to sign for the Swans, but terms couldn't be agreed (how many times have we heard that one, Dougie?). Joey definitely made an impact here and will probably turn out to be another John Salako! ROGER FREESTONE came back again and looked so much better this time. He is a class keeper. We had a hell of a bargain when we bought him for £50,000. Another player who performed well during his stay was PHIL PURNELL. A Bristol Rovers man from school (and during school), this 27-year old gave us some width on the pitch. We definitely should have signed either him or Joey.





Just as a conclusion, the Swans are always laughed at for giving away DEAN SAUNDERS (the multi-million pound Jack). But I always look on the bright side and laugh at the Blue Shits. Deano made 4 league appearances on loan for them and they didn't want him either!! "Not good enough" was the quote. They really know their football in Cardiff don't they?

Finally, did you know that JIMMY "When he gets the ball he scores a goal (or three)" GILLIGAN was on loan to Newport County in 1986/87? Not a lot of people know that!!

Swans midfielder Shaun Chapple won the Barclays Young Eagle of the Month for last November (Wales & West), a marvellous choice made by Terry Yorath (his only good decision in his football career, apart from accepting the sack from Dougie!). The South Wales Echo didn't entirely agree with this decision and pointed out he'd only made two appearances during the month. Do these so-called South Wales Echo reporters have any knowledge of football? I suppose they have to endure watching the Blue Shits every week and if they're really lucky, a day out at Barry Town is the prize. Come to the Vetch and see some real football lads!

Word has it that Rick Wright is amending his admission scheme that came into force at the start of the season. For each home game, it will now be £10 if Scum are out of the top seven (all season in other words), and £7.99 if they are in positions 2 – 7. In the impossible situation where they are top of the league, the admission charge will be 20p. This way they'll rake the money in and may then be able to afford Ian Rush's big toe nail. Anyway, a survey was conducted among South Wales Echo readers on Rick's new fabulous idea and 98% of the readers were actually in favour of the changes. The other 2% said they now go to Toys-R-Us on a Saturday afternoon, so it didn't affect them anymore.

City's pathetic performance was in keeping with a long tradition of pathetic performances regular fans have come to recognise. In some seasons they come more regularly than others.

It was a genuine pity that this season's aberration came when chairman Rick . Wright's initiative had put women and children first at Ninian Park. The move had enticed a new generation of recruits to City's blue and white army, away from their sitting room TV screens.

Jim and his sister Ellen, aged eight, were among hundreds of youngsters who needed hundred instructions from parents in the rudiments of soccer, and soccer watching — like why the pasties are never hot but the Oxo always burns your tongue.

For genuine fans, the first visit of their child to their ground is a big occasion.
So I bored mine rigid with the story of how I made my Ninian Park debut on a lovely sunny day in late 1959, carried there on the crossbar of my dad's bike.

I featured the reserves against a team in white shirts and red shorts who I have always assumed to have been Walsall's reserves.

But everything else about it is still so vivid — the first sight of the pitch, a seat in the grandstand, real men playing and not the kickabouts we used to watch on Ely Racecourse.

Now I hope the youngsters who went to the game yesterday will be able to recall similar details about their first visit to Ninian Park. I doubt whether they will forget the result. I have have gone 32 years without seeing them lose 5-0 at home. I hurriedly tried to

explain it wasn't always like that.

The most difficult part was explaining why so many people were walking out of the ground with 20 minutes of the match to go.


